The Committee also beg leave to return their thanks to Major LEONARD, late of the 104th Regiment for his liberal donation, and accept it as a grateful proof of that sympathetic feeling, which appears to have attracted the mind of the benevolent Donor.

SIR,

I have the honor to transmit to your Excellency a return of the articles issued from the King's Magazines at this place, for the relief of the sufferers by the late calamitous fires in New-Brunswick. The whole of these supplies were shipped in the bark *St. Lawrence*; (as your Excellency will have been already informed) which sailed from hence on the 4th instant.

The Commander of the Forces has great pleasure in finding that the subscriptions raised in Quebec, and Montreal, were anticipated in Nova Scotia, where it is understood the contributors have been on a liberal scale and it will be a source of much gratification to His Lordship, should the offerings of private benevolence, aided by the supplies from the public Stores, afford effectual protection, to the distressed objects for whom they are intended, against the severities of the approaching season.

Mr. JOPLIN, the Gentleman who was charged with your Excellency's Dispatch, appeared to be of opinion that the Bedding might prove more than sufficient for their wants in that article, which His Lordship will be very glad to find confirmed.

A report will be made to the Treasury of the afflicting circumstance which has induced the Commander of the Forces to draw to such extent upon the Military depots here, and it is presumed that no time will be lost on the part of the Government at home, in communicating instructions as to the manner in which the issues are to be finally accounted for.
