Charlotte-Town, Oct. 29, 1825.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Excellency's communication of the 15th inst. Intelligence of the melancholy and afflicting calamity therein recorded, had reached us some days previous by persons direct from Miramichi. I lost not a moment in calling together the members of His Majesty's Council and Principal Inhabitants of Charlotte-Town. Subscrip tions were instantly enteredinto, a Schooner hired and new loading with Provisions, Clothing &c. &c., and I hope in a day or two be able to put to sea. A like feeling is manifested at Bedeque and Prince Town, and from information from these places, which are from their vicinity more connected with the scene of wretchedness and desolation, and consequently more acquainted with the wants of the unfortunate sufferers, I am led to hope that succours to a considerable amount will have, ere this, reached the spot from thence.

New-Brunswick Agricultural and Emigrant Society.

At a Meeting of the Central Board and of other members of the New-Brunswick Agricultural and Emigrant Society, held at the Province Hall on Saturday the 7th January, 1826.

Captain Douglas presented a Communication written by Command of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, announcing to the Meeting the very gratifying intelligence that His Excellency has received the sanction of His Majesty's Government to appropriate the sum of Three hundred pounds, in aid of the Agricultural Society, for the present year; and that His Excellency, desirous of applying this as soon as possible in a way that may be most productive of the benefits which His Excellency contemplates, by exciting emulation, and a spirit of improvement in Agricultural pursuits; and believing that the importation of seeds, and of the most improved implements of Husbandry, which may be adapted to the circumstances of this Country is much wanted, and would produce the most beneficial effects; His Excellency is desirous that \$200 of the above Sum should be immediately applied by the Central Board to this purpose; and in order that the operation may be of a more permanent nature, as in the grant which his Excellency has given for the annual importation of Stock, His Excellency is desirous, that the Implements and Seeds imported, be sold, annually, either at prime cost, to such persons as are Contributors to the funds of the Society, or by public Auction; and the proceeds of the sale (made up to the total cost of the articles including freight &c.) reinvested in the purchase of Implements or Seeds, and sold in turn, in such parts of the Province as the Committee may assign.

Whereupon Resolved, that the thanks of this Board be presented to His Excellency for this fresh proof of His Excellency's earnest endeavours to encourage and promote that branch of Industry, in the judicious and extended prosecution of which the best interests of this Province are so deeply concerned.

And further Resolved that the mode of appropriation recommended by His Excellency in this instance, as well as the plan which accompanied His Excellency's donation for the purchase and importation of Stock, of improved breeds, are in the opinion of this Board, the best that could have

been devised; and are eminently calculated to produce permanent and extensively useful effects from the application of those very liberal grants.
