DUBLIN, Aug. 19.

As we were going to press, we received intelligence of a most alarming outrage committed by upwards of 200 persons, all around with fire arms, on the lands of Croghen Hill.—*Westmeath Journal.*

We can state correctly from a respectable person who travelled through the counties of Westmeath, Meath, Louth, Roscommon, Letrim, Galway, King's and Queen's Counties, within the last fortnight, that any thing to equal the Oat crops can scarcely be described; in most parts one half has been pulled; and the general average crop, except on some land, will not exceed four barrels to an acre;—the barley crop nearly the same; the wheat not near the return that might be expected from the appearance.

BUENOS AYRES, May, 27.

Chile.—By recent correspondence from Chile, says the Aura Mendozina, of Mencoza, of the 7th inst. we learn that the frigate Maria Isabel, and two other vessels of the Chiliantsquadron, are engaged to join that of Buenos Ayres. Four thousand swords, and five hundred quintals of gunpowder, are to leave Chile for Buenos Ayres between the 10th and 15th of the ensuing month.

Cordova.—A silver mine of extraordinary richness, has been discovered in this province. It is a vein of more than a yard at the commencement;—and the metal can almost be cut out with a chisel.
