WHEREAS the appointment of persons to be clerks in the Court who reside in different parts of this Province and are remote from the place where the sittings of the Court are held, has been the occasion of great inconvenience, and has exposed the records and papers of the Court to accident and loss: It is therefore ordered that all the appointments heretofore made of persons as clerks of the Court, be, and the same are hereby revoked and vacated: and it is further ordered, that the Registrar of this Court be the officer in lieu of the clerks to transact and file all proceedings by bill, and answer and to have the custody of all Record papers, and proceedings relating to cases in equity, and to make and sign all office copies thereof, and to enroll the decrees of the Court, and to sign and seal all writs and process on the equity side of the Court, and to perform all other such like services which appertained to the office of clerks of this Court.

ALL Persons who have received and who have not yet accounted for the Expenditure of any public monies entrusted to their care and expenditure are hereby required to make up and transmit their several Accounts (post paid) to this office duly attested, and with the proper Vouchers in their support, by the first day of December next, or their Defaults will be reported to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor as directed by the Act of Assembly "for the better examining and auditing the Public Accounts of this Province."

The Accounts must be stated Dr. & Cr. with the Province, and the warrants credited each separately, and the purpose for which granted. The payments made must have distinct Vouchers applying to each Charge and corresponding in number and Amount: The Accounts must state whether any and what parts of the work have been done by Contract, also the names of the Contractors, the nature of the contract, whether by the rod or other distance, or so much for the whole, or in what other way? how the Contract has been performed and what sums have actually been paid?—If done by Days work? to state the names of the workmen, the rate of wages per day of each man whether found in provisions or not? the number of days which each man has worked, the amount paid to each man, the quantity of work done, and the mode in which the same has been performed; The proper receipts must accompany the accounts of all monies paid by the commissioners, and (if the same are Signed with a mark) they must be witnessed by at least one respectable witness:—The Commissioners Account must be attested to before a Justice of the Peace, and the Oath must be in the following form or to that effect viz. "We A. B. & C. D. the Commissioners within named do make Oath that the foregoing Account is correct and true and that the several sums therein mentioned as paid have actually been paid by us as therein Stated"

The London dates by the English Mail on Saturday last, are to the 8th of July. The Elections throughout England and Scotland had nearly terminated; but not so in Ireland, they were still strongly contested at the last dates; many riots had taken place, in which, several lives were lost.

Fire in Liverpool, Eng.—In the night of the 6th July, fire was observed issuing from the Warehouse of Messrs. Aspinall and Knowles, in Oxford Street, which in a few hours destroyed nine other Warehouses, each it is said, contained much valuable property; the loss is estimated at about £100,000. The particulars will be given in our next.

CROPS.—Bell's Weekly Messenger of the 3d July, in the Agricultural report for June, says "Never has there been a finer June for hay-making, and seldom perhaps a lighter crop of hay. The rain which fell in the last day of May and the beginning of the present month, came too late to effect all the improvement which was hoped for from it." The crop of sainfoin is however generally in moist situations are withering and becoming brown. The corn crops on the uplands, except where the soil is cool, or retentive, or rich, or mellow, have suffered a deterioration. On weak soils of all descriptions the wheat will not make good its promise and the barley and oats are thin, short and patchy. On fertile soils, not too dry or hot, the crops of grain are unquestionably magnificent, particularly of wheat and barley.

In a paper in our possession we have a detailed account of the electing of the Hon. W. Maule of Panmure, for the county of Forfar in Parliament. He was elected without opposition. This gentleman as many of our readers are aware is the brother of His Excellency the Earl of Dalhousie. This is the seventh time that Mr. Maule has been returned for the same place. Nova Scotian.

CUSTOM HOUSE REGULATIONS.
We copy the following from a Jamaica paper We are informed that the information is accurate, and that the same principle with regard to the payment of duties, is to be acted upon in this Province.—Nova-Scotian.

ARTICULA, June 20.—We understand that the important subject of the appropriation of the Duties collected under the new acts of Trade (6th G. VI c. 73 & 114 has in consequence of the strong representations made by this Colony and one or two others, been again under the consideration of the Lords of his Majesty's Treasury, who have given directions, that the produce of all the Duties of Customs in each Colony, existing previously to the 5th January, 1826, shall be ascertained upon an average of the three years ending at that period—That the Duties collected, and to be collected, subsequently to that date, shall to the extent of the average amount so ascertained, be appropriated as follows: one fourth to be retained as salaries of the officers of Custom—three fourth to be paid over to the Treasurer or Receiver General of the Colony; and all excess of produce, beyond the average amount so appropriated, shall be liable to the charge of the Salaries of the Revenue Officers in the first instance and the surplus, if any, after payment thereof be made over to the Colonial Treasury.

In the charge of the Establishment, to be thus defrayed, their Lordships do not include the allowances proposed to be made to the Naval Officers, on the abrogation of their offices; although the fees formerly taken by these officers were a charge

upon the Colonies, yet as their duties were not immediately connected with the collection of the Revenue, their Lordships conceive it may be proper to give to the Colonies the full benefit of the abolition of the Naval Offices, and to defray the charge of the retired allowance out of the gross produce of the Customs in the United Kingdom."

By Leeward Island Papers we are informed, that in St. Kitt's the question in dispute between the Collector of the Customs and the Colonial Authorities, respecting the appropriation of the duties received under the provisions of the New Trade Acts, had been "set at rest," by the Collector paying over to the Treasurer of the Island the whole of those duties.—Barbadian.

New-Brunswick Agricultural and Emigrant Society.

At a General Meeting of the New Brunswick Agricultural and Emigrant Society, holden at the Province Hall on the 4th day of March 1826, it was resolved that a Cattle Show be held at Cough's in Sussex Vale, on Wednesday the 20th day of September next, and that premiums as follow be granted to the owners of Animals that may then be Exhibited.

- FOR THE BEST PROVINCIAL BRED Stallion rising 4 years old, £10 0
- For the best pair of Provincial bred Mares of Geldings, not less than 4, nor more than 10 years old, owned by one person, 10 0
- For the best Bull, not less than 2, nor more than 4 years old; not being one of those intended to be imported by this Society, 5 0
- For the second best do. do. do. 3 0
- For the best Cow not less than 3 years old, do. do. do. 2 10
- For the best Ram, not less than 3 nor exceeding 5 years old, do, do. do. 5 0
- For the second best do. do. do. 2 10
- For the best Ewe do. do. do. 2 0
- For the best Boar, 2 0
- For the best Sow, 1 0
- For the best fat Ox not under 4 years old, 5 0
- For the second best do. do. do. 3 0
- For the best pair of working Oxen not less than 4 years old, owned by one person 5 0
- For the second best pair of Working Oxen, do. do. do. 2 10
- For the five best Fat Wethers, not

less than 4 years old, owned by one person, 5 0
For the five second best, do. do. 2 10
It was further Resolved that premiums as follow, be given:—

For the greater quantity of good Butter, produced from any one Dairy in this Province, between the 1st May, and the 1st November in the present year, £10 0
For the next greatest quantity of Butter, do do. do. £5 0
These two last mentioned Premiums to be awarded at the next Annual Meeting.

RULES OF COMPETITION.

- I. the decision of the Judges appointed to award the prizes, to be final.
- II. The owner of any Animal for which a Premium is claimed, must give information in writing to the Secretary, what breed the Animal is of, and where bred.
- III. To entitle any Claimant to Premiums for the best and Second best Fat Oxen and Wethers, it is further required, that he not only exhibit a Statement of the mode of fattening, but prove that these Animals have been kept within this Province for at least Twelve Months prior to the day of Exhibition.
- IV. Claimants for Premiums for the Best and second best Working Oxen, must prove that each pair had been worked together, at least Six Months before the day of Exhibition.
- V. The quantity and quality of the butter for which Premiums may be claimed, to be proved by the Affidavit of the Claimant, confirmed by the Affidavit of two respectable neighbours.
- VI. No Premium to be awarded to any person who is not a Member of the Central Society, or of some one of the County Agricultural Societies in this Province, and no owner of an Animal for which any Premium may have heretofore been awarded, will be entitled to any of the above premiums for the same Animal.
- VII. Whenever merely from want of Competition, any claimant may be considered entitled to the Premium, under a liberal construction; and yet in the opinion of the Judges, the Animal for which the Premium is claimed, is not superior to many others in the Province, not exhibited; the Judges shall then have a right to reject such claim.

THE QUARTER'S REVENUE,

We have much satisfaction in announcing to our readers the result of the Quarterly Account made up yesterday. The lateness of the hour at which we received this satisfactory Document precludes us from making any particular comments upon it this day. But, happily, it speaks strongly and most sufficiently for itself. It exhibits in the account of the Consolidated Fund, an excess instead of a falling off, in the receipts of the July Quarter of the present year, as compared with those of the same Quarter in 1825; and in the account of the whole Revenue, the receipts of the Quarter are only £498,295, short of those of the same period last year.

We are aware of some circumstances by which the excess in the Consolidated Fund is partly created; but when the diminution occasioned by the measures of relief to the subject, adopted in the last Session, is set against those circumstances, it will still be found that the produce of the Quarter now before us has fully equalled the estimates and expectations of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, as stated to Parliament at the commencement of the year.
