Fredericton, 26th January, 1826. INSTRUCTIONS have been receiv ed from his Majesty's Government by which the foll wing Uniform is permit ted to be worn by the Governors, Liente pant Governors, and Superior Civil Offi cers, of His Majesty's Colonial Possessions The Uniform for Colonial Governors.

The same Uniform as that worn by Lord Lieutenants of the English Counties, only the bidy of the Uniform to be blue, with red Lapells. The Epsulers and Eproidery to be also the same as Lords Lieutenants of Counties.

*Superi r Civil Officers. Blue Coass, but no Epaulerts ; nor La pris, Button Holes upon the Cuff and Collar only, but same Pattren as the Lords Lieutenanis, rods land

*The C : O'fice's who are permitted to west the above Uniform, are the Members of the Legisla tive and Executive Councils, the Chief Justice, and Speaker of the House of Assembly.

4 PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS the Right Honourable Earl BATHURST, one of His ajesty's principal Secretaries of State, has trans mitted to me. the following order of His Majesti in Council : - viz :

At the Court at Carlton House, 23d March, 1825. PRESENT.

The King's most Excellent Majesty,

HEREAS is has been represented the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that they have given directions, that His Majesty's Troops, serving in the everal British Colonies and Possessions abroad, should in certain cases be paid in British Silver, and Copper Money, and that with a view of securing the circulation of such Money in those Colonies it would be expedient that an order is. Council should be issued, declaring that in all those Cwlo nies where the Spanish Dollar, is now eather by Law. Fact, or Practice, considered as a legal tender for the discharge of Debts, or where the duties to the Government are ra ted or collected, or the Individuals have a right to pay in the description of Coin, that a tender and poyment of British Silver Money, to the amount of Four Shillings and Four Pence, should be considered as equivalent to the sender or payment of one

any greater or less amount of Debt. And Whereas it has been further represented by the Lords Commissioners of His Mejesty's Treasury, that with respect to the Cape of Good Hope, where there are not any Spanish Dollars in circulation, consists entirely of paper Rix Dollars and its proportions, and with respect to Ceylon, where the circulation consists of Silver and Paper Rix Dollars, as well as of a variety of other Coins, which are generally rereived and paid with relation to their value as compared with Rix Dollars, it would be expedient that a tender and payment of one Shilling and six pence in British Silver Money, should be considered as equivalent as a tender and payment of one such Rix Dollar, so current at the Cape of Good Hope, and Ceylon, respectively, and so in proportion, tor any greater or less sum, and also, that British Copper Money, should be made a

Spanish Dollar, and so in proportion for

tegal render in all the British Colon's for its due and proper proportions of British Silver Money, as by Law established in Great Britain, but that no person shall be compelled to take more than 12d. in Cop per Money, in any one payment. His Majesty having taken the said representation mo consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed, and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majes v's Treasury, and the Right Hono rable Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaties of State, are to give the necessary directions, herein as to them may respectively appertain.

(Signed,) C. C. GREVILLE. I do therefore hereby make known the came to all His Mijerry's loving subjects in this Province, and all persons concerned will take due notice, and govern themselves ecordingly.

And I do also hereby further make known that the holders of British Silver Money, may demand from the Officers in charge of the Commissariar Department, -Bills upon the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury at thirty days sight. in Exchange for whatever sums may be endered by them in British Silver, not less e amount than one hundred Pounds at the axed rate of a Brill for one hundred Pounds, for every one hundred and three Pourds of British Silver Money, so tendered.

Saturday. 25th Feb.

On Motion of Mr. Parker, - " Resolved, that this House is deeply sensible of the avor of His Majesty's Government in establishing a Colle, e in this Province; the honors and advantages of which, so far as can consistently be done, may be attainable without subscription to the Articles of the Church or any other religious tests, this House being satisfied that any such restrictions would not have tended to advance the cause of Religion or the Church; but would have hindered the institution from ever attaining to any eminence or general useful ess; if they d d not entirely prevent its first establishment upon any permanent basis; And this House is also duly grateful for the liberality shewn by His Majesty's Government in the donation of large Sums for the erection of a building, and in the promise of further donations for the endowment of the College.

Resolved that this House also, entertains a deep and grateful sense of the paternal care and unremitting exertions of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, so strongly evinced in the measures tak en by him for obtaining the consent and approval of His Majesty's Government, to the founding a University on such liberal principles and endowments as cannot fail 'o be of great, general, and lasting benefit to this Province

"Resolved that this House so opinion, that it is highly expedient and proper that a sufficient sum houd be granted out of the public Fouds, of this Province, to the Givernor and Trustees of the Collegenf New-Britiswick to enable them, with the monies already in their hands, or secured for that

purpose, to ere t a sun be build og for the secommo lation of the President, Professors and todents, and the pib c apartments and offices of the Univers ty ; And that a further yearly sum should be granted towards the support of the Institution

" Resolved that it is the opinion of this House, that in the present state of the Province, the sum of Eight Thousand Pounds will be amply sufficient to en, be the G vernor and Trustees, to erect such suitable building; and that as they have now in hand, S. R. Thousand Pounds, the remainder should be supplied by the public, payable at such times as may hereafter be directed; and it is the wish of this House, that no time should be lost in erecting the huilding; and that a plan may be adopted, which can be realter be conveniently added to in case further accomm cation should be found necessary. " And further Resolved, that as soon as the College is erected and established, there be included in the annual expences of the Province, the sum of Two Hundred and F fty Poneds to be paid to the said Governor and Trustees, (in addition to the sum of £850 already granted, to go towards the endowment of the said College "

MESSAGES EROM HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

Tuesday. 28th Feb. "The Lieutenant Governor directs to be laid before the House, Copy of a Disparch from His Excelency Sir lames Kemer, by which the House will perceive that although private contributions had fully deleased the Extences incurred in Nova Semia for the select of the sofferers here Yet the Legislature of that Province have generously approprieted he sum of O'e Thousand Pounds, which had been pledged by His Excellency for that purposes, and the same has been accordingly placed at the L'entenant-Governor's disposal

" The Lieutenant-Governor also informs the House, that a similar sum has in like manner been appropria ed by the Lagislature of Upper Canada, which sum has been remitted here, although the official information has not yet been received.

"The Lieure cant Governor siso communicates, for the information of the House, an Account of expences incurred in Quebec, for the relief of the a fferers at Miramichi : And he relies on the House redeeming the pledge given on the part of this Gover ment, and appro priating the sum of Six Thousand Pounds; to be applied either in aid of the General Fund or to repay any part of the expences incurred at Quebec, that may hereafter be requir-

"The Lieutenant-Governor communicates to the House of Assembly the Copy of a Disparch from the Right Honorable Farl BATHURST, one of His Majesty's principal ecretaries of State, on the subject of Establishing the British Metallic Currency as a cuculating medium in this Province; and also a Report of the Officers of His Majesty's Customs at Saint John, with an opinion of the Attorney and Solicitor General thereon: And as it appears to be necessary, in order to carry into effect the objects desired by His Majesty's G vernment, to repeal certain Acts of the Colonial Legislature, or to make some other I egislative Provision, the Lieutenant Governor recommends this subject to the consideration of the House "

The packet ship Manhattan arrived at New York, on Sunday morning last, from Liverpool, whence she sailed on the 8th lanuary.

The accounts of the years and quarters revenue of England, ending the 5th January. 1826, exhibit a decrea e in the produce of the year 1825 compared with that of 1824, of £258,940; and a deficiency, in the last quarter, compared with the corresponding quarter of the previous year, of £1.189 966. This deficiercy is attributed parily to the recent difficulties in the meney market, and partly to the repeal or reduction of the duties on wine, coffee, cocoa, hemp, tobacco, taxes, &c.

The news from St. Petersburgh clears up all doubt as to the succession of the Grand Duke Constantine. It seems that a document did exist, by which Constantine had formerly renounced the crown in favour of his brother, the Arch Duke Nicholas; but when the news of Alexander's death reached Saint Petersburg, the latter refused to act upon its conditions; and, instead of placing the rrown upon his own head, esused Constantine to be proclaimed and the oath of allegiance to be taken to him. This document had been signed and sealed in triplicate; and Constantine being determined to allow it to be enforced, remained at Warsaw until he heard the result of his determina-
