A PROCLAMATION.

IN Pursuance of the Powers vested in me by an Act of Parliament passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty intitled "An Act to Regulate the Trade of the British Possessions abroad," I have thought fit, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to appoint and I do hereby, by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, appoint the Town of Fredericton and the Parish of Woodstock in the County of York, as Places of Entry for the entry of Goods brought or imported from any adjoining Foreign Country pursuant to the Provisions of the said Act:—Of which all Persons concerned will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six and in the Seventh year of His Majesty's Reign.

Civil Appointment.

His Excellency has been pleased to appoint JOHN M. JOHNSON, Esq. to be one of the Coroners for the County of Northumberland.

On Wednesday evening last their Excellencies Sir HOWARD and LADY DOUGLAS gave a Concert at Government-House to a numerous Assembly:—being the second entertainment of the kind this Season.

The most insensible to the charms of Music could not fail to receive gratification at these Concerts, where the voice, the Pianoforte and the Harp vied with each other in alternate succession, or mingled their harmonies together. They afforded a new opportunity of enjoying the vocal abilities of the Lady who lately exerted her talents so benevolently and so delightfully in the cause of Charity. Admiration seemed to balance between the fascinations of her voice, and the masterly performances on the Harp and Pianoforte.

The excellent Band of the 53d Regt. executed with their usual spirit and correctness several pieces from the works of Haydn, Mozart, Rossini, &c.—Two or three Officers of that distinguished Corps, also took a part in the performances, both Vocal and Instrumental; ever as ready to contribute to, as to participate in the general amusement.

We hope their Excellencies will often indulge the Society of Fredericton with this species of entertainment so calculated to diversify and refine our enjoyments, and for which the musical attainments of our own domestic circle afford such ample means.

LAW INTELLIGENCE.

At the Inferior Court of Common Pleas holden at Newcastle in the County of Northumberland in August last; an action of assumpsit was tried, in which John Hennessy was Plaintiff, and Benjamin Salter, Defendant, Alexander Davidson, Esq. who tried the cause, ordered the Plaintiff to become nonsuit, to which order Mr. End, Counsel for the Plaintiff, would not submit, but insisted that the question should be left to the Jury.—It went accordingly to the Jury who brought in a verdict of £40 for the Plaintiff, with costs. On motion to the Inferior Court for Judgment on this verdict, (all the Judges being present) they refused to grant Judgment, alledging that the verdict was contrary to law, justice, and evidence. In Michaelmas Term last, Mr. End moved the Supreme Court for a Rule against the Inferior Judges to shew cause why a Mandamus should not issue to compel them to sign judgment in this cause, which rule was granted, and in this present Hilary Term, cause was shown by Counsel: But the whole Court Ruled, "Inferior Courts have no power to grant new Trials. Judgment must be signed upon the Verdict. Let the Rule be made absolute with costs, and let a peremptory mandamus go to the Inferior Judges to compel them to sign Judgment." In the case of James Ledden and James Abbott vs. Archibald Duncan.
Like Case—like Rule.

His Excellency gave his assent to the following Bill on the 24th ult.

A Bill for appointing Commissioners to inquire into the losses occasioned by the late destructive Fires in this Province.

House of Assembly, 7th March 1826.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod requiring the immediate attendance of this House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended in obedience to the commands of His Excellency, and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported that he had addressed His Excellency as follows:

May it please Your Excellency.

THE House of Assembly beg leave to tender to Your Excellency the Bills of Revenue and Supply passed during the present Session, and humbly pray Your Excellency's assent thereto.

In addition to the ordinary services we have provided as liberally as the state of the Treasury would admit for the important objects which Your Excellency was pleased to recommend to our attention; and we beg to assure Your Excellency of our perfect confidence that the grants will, under your Excellency's direction and superintendance, be so expended as to realize the high expectations which we, in common with all our Constituents, have formed, from the wisdom and sound discretion which have so eminently distinguished Your Excellency's Administration.

We have attentively considered the several plans and estimates for the erection of a suitable Building for the College; and although the ordinary grant only has been made by Law; we have pledged the House by vote for a sum which we hope will, in conjunction with the liberal Donations from His Majesty's Casual Revenue be found sufficient for that highly important object.

The obvious necessity of relieving Your Excellency as speedily as possible from the great inconvenience to which Your Excellency and Family have been and are exposed, owing to the destruction of the late Government House by fire, induced the House without a moment's hesitation to place at Your Excellency's disposal a sum sufficient, we hope, for the restoration of the Building, which we ardently wish Your Excellency may long continue to occupy.

His Excellency was then pleased to give his assent to the following Bills:—

A bill to continue an Act intituled "An Act, to regulate the cutting of Saw Logs, on the River Magagaudavic, and its various branches."

A bill to continue an Act intituled, "An Act to empower and authorize the Justices of the County of Westmorland, at their General Sessions of the Peace, to regulate the grazing and depasturing the several Marshes, low lands and Meadows, within the said County."

A bill to amend the Act, to prevent the bringing of Infectious Distempers into the City of Saint John.

A bill for further regulating Servants and Apprentices.

A bill to maintain an armed Cutter for the protection of the Revenue of the Province.

A bill to authorize and empower the Magistrates of the County of Charlotte, to sell the County Gaol and Gaol Lot, in the Town of Saint Andrews, and to erect a more suitable Building in the said Town, in lieu thereof.

A bill for the better extinguishing of Fires that may happen within the City of Saint John, and to repeal all the Acts now in force relating to the same.

A bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Northumberland, to levy an assessment to pay off the County Debt.

A bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace of the County of Northumberland, to regulate the Grazing and Depasturing of certain tracts of Land within that County.

A bill to extend the power of the Fire Wards in the Parish of Fredericton, and to make further regulations for the better extinguishing of Fires that may happen in the said Parish.

A bill to repeal all the Laws now in force for the regulation of Seamen, and to make more effectual provision for the same.

A bill in further amendment of the Law in force, for the support and relief of Confined Debtors.

A bill, in addition to and in amendment of the several Acts now in force, to provide for Sick and Disabled Seamen, not being paupers belonging to this Province.

A bill further to prevent Illicit and Clandestine trade in this Province.

A bill to regulate the Manufacturing and Shipment of Grindstones from the County of Westmorland.

A bill, to incorporate the Minister and Elders of the Kirk of Scotland in the Town of St. Andrews.

A bill, to provide for the expences of the Judges holding the Circuit Courts and Courts of Oyer and Terminer, in this Province, and of the Clerk in those Courts.

A bill for granting Bounties on Grain raised on new land.

A bill to authorize the Rector, Church Wardens and Vestry of Christ Church in the Parish of Saint Stephen, to dispose of a part of a Tract of Globe Land in that Parish, and to vest the proceeds in other Lands more productive to the Rector.

A bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Sunbury to levy an assessment, to enable them to pay off the County Debt.

A bill, for the division of the County of Northumberland into three Counties, and to provide for the Government and representation of the two new Counties.

A bill, for regulating the Salmon and Shad Fisheries, so far as the same may relate to the River Peticodiac in the County of Westmorland.

A bill in amendment of an Act, for regulating, laying out and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways within the several Towns and Parishes within this Province.

A bill, to repeal an Act intituled an Act to alter and in addition to an Act intituled an Act, for establishing a Tender in all payments to be made in this Province, and declaring in what manner certain past debts may be paid.

A bill, to provide for the rebuilding of Government House.

A bill to continue and revise the Revenue Laws of the Province.

A bill to impose a duty on Horses imported into this Province, and for other purposes.

A bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to provide for the Ordinary Services of the Province.

A bill, to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province.

A bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the Services therein mentioned.

And that His Excellency was then pleased to deliver the following Speech:—

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council,

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

IN releasing you from the labors of an important Session, I have great pleasure in assuring you that I receive with the highest satisfaction these results of deliberations which you have conducted with so much harmony, liberality, wisdom and ability.

When, in the refined spirit of our glorious Constitution, the business of the Country is thus conducted, the exercise of the Superintending Power becomes a pleasing duty; the public weal well secured, and all its best interests advanced; and thus I have

recorded, to which it will ever be pleasing to yourselves to revert, and which cannot fail to produce abundant good, now, hereafter, and elsewhere.

I thank you for the liberal Appropriations you have made for the services of the present year. I acknowledge particularly the bountiful Grant you have made to a fund which, in the spirit of your own purpose, charity and benevolence had already formed for the relief of our sufferers in a late calamity. Under the safeguards which your wisdom has provided in the late enactment, I shall now proceed to make an equitable distribution of those funds.

I thank you, also, for the liberal Grant you have made towards the erection of a suitable Building for the University of New Brunswick, in the success of which, I take deep and paternal interest: And whilst I lament the circumstances which have occasioned so heavy a charge, I thank you for the liberal sum voted for the erection of a new Government House.

With so many claims upon the Public Purse, your Appropriations have been regulated by a liberality fully equal to my wishes; and I shall endeavor to apply the means which you have thus put at my disposal, to the several purposes for which they are intended, in a manner which will, I hope, effectually promote those important objects.
