IN common with the rest of the Inhabitants of Newcastle and the vicinity, the proposer suffered losses from the disastrous "Collision," which disabled him from proceeding in the establishment of a Weekly Paper for which he had settled there, and embarked all his little capital and resources—Having, however, first to project the accomplishment of an object so useful to the public of Miramichi, in the County Town, and having experienced the liberality and kindness of the inhabitants of Newcastle, Chatham, and other neighbouring places, in the readiness with which they then subscribe to the undertaking, he confidently trusts that the remembrance of his exertions, well meant, however unfortunate, and the recollection of their common sufferings, will be inducements of some weight in favour of his present views. A very respectable journal having since been set on foot at Chatham, it might be argued that this circumstance had entirely superseded the necessity and utility of another paper in the same district; but while hopes exist of re-edifying Newcastle, and restoring it to its previous importance, the best mode of effecting the desired end, will be to encourage the institution of those establishments which characterize a flourishing town, and to give every facility to the diffusion of commercial and agricultural information. As the three towns, much of the business of the country around must centre in it, and all the natural advantages of situation found the indulgence of gloomy and unhappy anticipations as to the future prospects of Miramichi.

Besides these reasons, competition, which is the soul of every business, laudable and generous emulation, is as conducive to the public interest as it is instrumental in compelling individuals to the fullest development of their energies, and the most unhesitating application of their talents. The increase of Journals gives more room for the free and free discussion of the wants and habits of society, and secures a more candid and unbiased conduct in the Editor's selection of those who are entrusted with their management. In this instance the proposer will publish on a different day of the week from that on which the Mercury appears, intelligence of every description will be transmitted with greater rapidity to the community than it can be while but one weekly paper is distributed in the country.

In requesting of those whose hospitality and generous public spirit led them to patronize the publisher in his first essay, to resolve the same disposition towards him he cannot omit the opportunity of thanking them in the most heartfelt manner for the invariable kindness, which, through a stranger and a native of another province, he experienced from them. As he is at this moment procuring by every exertion on the materials required in re-establishing his press, and depending chiefly for the success of his plan on the number of subscriptions which he may receive, he can never forget the kind treatment he met with at Miramichi; and his regret, at the sufferings he encountered there, is augmented by the circumstance of his present separation from friends so sincere.
