TO THE PUBLIC.

WE are authorized to announce that for the purpose of giving the earliest publicity to all new Laws that may hereafter be passed in the General Assembly of this Province, copies of the same will in future be inserted in each succeeding Royal Gazette (as soon as possible after they have received His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's Assent) till the whole are published.

In our last we concluded the Examinations of the Honourable R. I. UNIACKE His Majesty's Attorney General for the Province of Nova Scotia, and HENRY BLISS Esq; Agent for New Brunswick, before a Committee of the House of Commons, on the general state of these Provinces, as to the inducements they held forth to Emigrants coming from the mother country—which on many points are interesting to persons connected with these countries. But we must agree with the Editor of the Novascotian that we should be but little benefited by a multitude of poor and needy people coming amongst us, the refuse of an overgrown population. For it is the industrious Agricultural labourers we want, such as are uncontaminated with the vices of manufacturing towns, who can bring with them a little capital to set them on their feet, and keep them for a short period clear of those difficulties into which many from a want of sufficient knowledge in clearing the forest have been led. If thousands of hungry mouths are sent out to us, the natural consequence will be that we shall be called upon to fill them.

We think it incumbent upon us to caution the charitably disposed in this town against affording relief to those females who go about stating themselves to have been deserted by their husbands—as it appears to be a system adopted by certain labouring men to get their families thus maintained for the winter, by leaving them after their summer's work is done, and just as the cold weather commences, a burthen to those whose hearts and hands are at all times open to relieve the truly distressed.

By order of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor the sum of £5,606: 8: 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Currency (in Cash,) was on the 14th instant, transmitted to the Committee of Distribution at Miramichi, and is part of the £15,500 allotted to the sufferers there by the Commissioners. About 15,000 dollars of this remittance, forms a portion of the very liberal subscriptions from the United States.

In addition to the favourable Report we had the pleasure of making in our last paper of the late harvest in this Province, we are informed by Captain HARDING, of Keswick Ridge, in the Parish of Douglas, that he has made this fall eighty-five barrels of Cider, having ground eight hundred bushels of Apples for that purpose, and being but the second year since the erection of his Mill.
