Fredericton, 26th January, 1826. INSTRUCTIONS have been receiv ed from his Majesty's Government, by which the following Uniform is permit ted to be worn by the Governors, Lieute pant-Governors, and Superior Civil Offi cers, of His Majesty's Colonial Possessions The Uniform for Colonial Governors.

The same Uniform as that worn by Lords Lieutenants of the English Counties, only to be also the same as Lords-Lieutenants of Counties.

"Superior Civil Officers. Blue Coats, but no Epauletts; nor Lasells, Button Holes upon the Cuff and Collar only, but same Patiren as the Lords-Lieutenants.

*The Civil Officers who are permitted to wear the above Uniform, are the Members of the Legislagive and Executive Conneils, the Chief Justice, and Speaker of the House of Assembly. By Command.

4 PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS the Right Honourable Zarl BATHERST, one of His Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, has transmitted to me, the following order of His

The King's most Excellent Majesty,

IN COUNCIL. HEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this hoard, by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that they have given directions, that His Majesty's Troops, serving in the everal British Colonies and Possessions abroad, should in certain cases be paid in British Silver, and Copper Money, and that with a view of securing the circulation of such Money in those Colonies it would be expedient thattan order it. Coun il should be issued, declaring that in all these Colonics where the Spanish Dollar, is now either by Law, Fact, or Practice, considered as legal tender for the discharge of Debrs, or where the duties to the Government are ra ted or collected, or the Individue is have right to pay in the description of Com, that a tender and payment of British Silver Money, to the amount of Four Shillings and Four Pence, should be considered as equivalent to the sender or payment of one Spanish Dollar, and so in proportion for

any greatener less amount of Dehi. And Whereas it has been further represented by the Lords Commissioners of His Mejesty's Treasury, that with respect to the Cape of Good Hope, where there are not any Spanish Dollars in circulation, consists entirely of paper Rix Dollars and its proportions, and with respect to Ceylan, where the circulation consists of Silver and Paper Rix Dollars, as well as of a variety of other sum of twenty-five pounds and upwards, Coins, which are generally received and over and above all discounts; and whereas paid with relation to their value as compared it has been proved to my satisfaction that with Rix Dollars, it would be expedient that a tender and payment of one Shilling

der and payment of one such Rix Dollar, so current at the Cape of Good Hop, and Certon, respectively, and so in proportion. for any greater or less sum, and also, that Beitish Copper Money, should be made a legal tender in all the British Colonies for us due and proper proportions of British Silver Money, as by Law established in Great Britain, but that no person shall be compelled to take more than 12d. in Copper Money, in any one payment. His Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve the body of the Uniform to be blue, with of what is therein proposed, and the Right red Lapells. The Epaulets and Ebreidery Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honorable Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions, herein as to them may respectively appertain.

And I do also hereby further make known that the holders of British Silver Money, may demand from the Officers in charge of the Commissariat Department, -Bills upon the Lords Commissioners of His Majesiy's Freasing at thirty days sight, in Exchange for whatever sums may be tendered by them in British Silver, not less in amount than one hundred Pounds at the fixed rate of a Bill for one hundred Pounds. for every one hundred and three Pounds of British Silver Money, so tendered.

The Council this day presented their Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor in answer to the Speech, as follows t-

To His Excellency Major General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, Baronet. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

The Humble Address of His Majesty's Courcil in General Assembly. May it please Your Excellency,

TIS Majesty's Council are fully sensible of Your Excellency's active attention to the public interests, in having summoned the General Assembly to meet at this early period, after the awful visitations by fire, which have desclated many parts of the Province.

The Council, while if ey acknowledge with humility and reverence the chastising hand of the Almighey inchese calamiteus one currences, yet find great rame for consolation in the occasion which these dispensations of Providence have afforded tor the exereise of christian charity and henevolence, so widely and conspicuously manifested in the generous efforts, made both at home and abroad, for the relief of the unhappy sufferers. They beg leave, in common with the Country, to tender to your Excellency, their tribute of grantude for your Excellency's judictions measures and great personal exercions under the melancholy erroumstances which called for immediate and energeric action. They receive with fraternal feeling, the affects nate marks of regard and of common interest, exhibited by the Colonial Governments and people of British North America, without exception, in their seady and widely extended donations .---And they acknowledge with peculiar satisfaction, the sympathetic and liberal contributions, made by native Citizens and British Residents in the United States, which evince so powerfully, the operation of principles truly Christian, and will greatly tend to cherish and preserve the good feeling and friendly relations which now happily subsist between the two Countries. They are sensible of the deep obligation to dispense in an equitable and proper manner the aggregate of bounty, flowing from so many and so various channels, and they rely with entire confidence on your Excellency in this re-

They fully concur in the suggestion made by your Excellency of the propriety of prohibiting by Law, the erection of buildings in certain situation and beyond certain dimensions, in the combustible material of the Country, as a very important measure of prevention against future danger by the ravages of fire,

The Council derive great satisfaction from the contemplation of the prosperous condition of the Province, and of its resources and capacities for improvement, which came in detail under your Excellency's observation in the course of the extensive Tour, highly beneficial to the Country in many respects, made by your Excellency during the last Summer.

They acknowledge, with gratitude, the liberality of the British Parliament, in admitting the Colonies to the same freedom of Trade, which is enjoyed by the inhabitants of the Mother Country; the natural tendency of which, unquestionably is greatly to increase the prosperity of these distant dominions ; and they confidently trust that the Legislature and people of New-Brunswick, being thus, in common with their an integral portion of the United Kingdom, will continue to evince the sense they entertain of their privileges and advantages, as a pire, by maintaining in its full vigor, thes
