do not intend to draw any invidious comparisons between the settlers of Madawaska, and those below the Fells, although I am by no means apprebensive that we would suffer by it, but it certainly wes not a very superior act of Policy in Mr. Coffin, to attempt to widen a Breach, (which is already but too great) by representing persons who had never done him an injury, and with very few of whom he was personally acquainted, as being enworthy of being received into the Family of Main; a man of an ordinary understanding would have suppressed that part, if even it was his opinion, because he would know that it must undoubte elly exasperate the minds of those whom it was his interest rather to conciliate.

In order that no misapprehensions may arise as if the objects and intentions of this Saciery, it is deemed necessary to publish the Rules and Regulations again with explanatory notes.

Rules & Regulations.

1st. " The object of this Society is to encourage and reward such Female Servants, as can produce satisfactory Testimoniais of their general good conduct for two years last past, having lived in one place twelve months of that period."

Note .-- Any person now living with a member of this Society, who can immediately bring from her Wristress such certificate, or who may at any future period become entitled thereto, shall be rewarded accordmgly.

2d. " Any particular acts of honesty and diligence shall be rewarded in a higher degree, and the rewards be propurtioned according to the tength of service over and a bove two years."

NOTE --- Whenever any Servant shews. herself wor by of trust, by the faithful distharge of any dary imposed upon her, she shall be rewarded; and in proportion to her length of service.

21. "Every encouragement shall be held out to Femile Servinis to resort to Fredericton and its vicinity, and a donation presented to all such as come well recommented, after a probation of one year."

Note ... By this it is to be understood, thit a conation shall be given to all Female. Em grants and Strangers who may be engagod as Servants by any member of this Soriely, who boing with ahem good recom mendations, and prove thems lives answers. ble thereto, after one years trial.

4 h. " No Member of this Society shall tereive any Female Servant without a writen character from her fast place, or person al application to her late. Mistress."

Nore ... This Rule does not bind any member to riject a Servani, who has not lived welve months in one place, but it compeis her to domind a character before she reterrei her; and the reasonable conclusion is. that no respectable Mis ress of a Family will receive a Servani who has been turned out of service elsewhere, for the find shonesty, or any malpractice. And it is of course, at the op ion of the Mistress, to take any stranfor upon trial, or any Female who may never have been out at service before.

5th. " All acts of dishonesty, insolence, nd disobedience, shall be punished by pub c disgrace."

Norg, ... That is, he name of all such of inders shall (as the agric od party think fit) published, and the off nders themselves, recurred at the Law.

6th. " The period for distr buting reards shall be the month of D cember, exept in particular cases, to be apportioned va Committee appliated for the purpose ly the Lady Patroness and Directors; they lemselves always forming a pari."

7th. The terms of admission into this clery shall be as follow :-- Halfa Guinea be paid on en rance -- and not less thin ilf a Ginea annually, to be paid on or be the first day of December."

8h. . A-1 ohnse names are hereunto subthed ho hemselves tirmly bound by he foregoing Rules

But the Society wish it to be understood that in thus endeavoring to protect themselves from such impositions as they have hitherto been subject to, it is their wish to increase the comfort and respectability of their Servants, and afford them an opportunity of establishing good characters.
