BY THE KING.—A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the second day of November next; we with the advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the second day of November next, to Tuesday the 14th day of November next; and we have given order to our Chancellor of that part of our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a writ patent for proroguing the same accordingly: and we do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare our Royal will and pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said 14th day of November next, be held and sit for the despatch of divers urgent and important affairs; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Boroughs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said 14th day of November next.

Given at our Court at Windsor, the 1st day of September, 1826, and in the 7th year of our reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

At the Court at Windsor, the 1st of September 1826; present the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by the laws now in force for regulating the importation of corn, oats and oatmeal may be imported into the United Kingdom and into the Isle of Man, for home consumption, under and subject to the regulations of the several statutes in that case made and provided, whenever the average price of oats (to be ascertained in the manner therein prescribed) shall be at or above the price of 27s. per quarter; and peas may in like manner be imported, whenever the price shall be at or about 53s. per quarter: and whereas by a certain act of Parliament, made and passed in the third year of his present Majesty's reign, entitled, "An act to amend the laws relating to the importation of corn," it is enacted, that whenever foreign corn, meal or flour, shall be admissible under the provisions of an act passed in the 55th year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the

Third, "An act to amend the law now in force for regulating the importation of corn," or under the provisions of the said act, passed in the third year of the reign of his present Majesty, there shall be levied and paid certain duties therein specified upon all such foreign corn, meal or flour, when admitted for home consumption; and whereas by the weekly returns of purchases and sales of corn, made by the several inspectors of corn, returns in the cities and towns of England and Wales to the receiver of corns returns, it appears that the average price of oats, and also the average price of peas, at the present time exceed the beforementioned prices of 27s. and 53s. per quarter; and whereas from information which hath this day been laid before his Majesty, it appears that the price of oats as well as that of peas, is still rising, and that the crops of peas and beans of the present year have failed to a considerable extent and that a deficiency in the crop of potatoes is also apprehended in some parts of the United Kingdom: and whereas if the importation, for home consumption, of oats and oatmeal, and of rye, peas and beans, be not immediately permitted, there is great cause to fear that much distress may issue to all classes of his Majesty's subjects:

And whereas, under the acts aforesaid, no foreign grain of the above description, whatever may be the respective average prices of the same, can be admitted to entry, for consumption, till after the 15th day of November in the present year, when the next quarterly average, by which the admission of such grain is regulated, will be made up according to the provisions of the said acts: His Majesty with the advice of his Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the foreign oats and oatmeal, rye, peas and beans, whether warehoused or otherwise, shall and may, from the date hereof, be permitted to be entered in the ports of the United Kingdom, and of the Isle of Man, for home consumption, provided the parties making entry of any such foreign oats, oatmeal, rye, peas, or beans, do give bond, with sufficient sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs, for the payment of duties hereinafter mentioned, in case Parliament

shall authorise the levy and receipt thereof, that is to say—

- Oats per quarter, 2s.
- Oatmeal per bolt, 2s. 2d.
- Rye, peas and beans, per quarter, 3s. 6d.

And His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, doth hereby further order, and it is accordingly ordered, that such permission to oats and oatmeal, rye, peas and beans for home consumption, on the conditions aforesaid, shall continue in force from the date hereof, until the expiration of 40 days, to be reckoned from the day of the next meeting of Parliament unless the Parliament shall previously to the expiration of the said 40 days make provisions to the contrary.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

London, Sept. 7.—According to the report of the best informed brokers, the situation of business as regards London, and with the exception of very few articles, has very materially improved, within the last six weeks. That improvement may be stated on most of the principal articles of Colonial produce, at about 15 or 16 per cent. in some cases perhaps more. The article which has been almost the last in receiving the new impulse given to commercial operations is Cotton, the only alteration in which, especially where the coarser descriptions of Cotton Wool are concerned, has been a greater facility of effecting sales, but at little or no advance of price.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 11.

STATE OF TRADE.—We rejoice to state, that a progressive improvement in the state of trade has been going on during the few preceding weeks. The improvement is not confined to one favoured spot, but appears to be general throughout the districts which suffered most severely from the recent depression of trade. In Liverpool, during the last fortnight commerce has exhibited greater activity than had been observable for some time previously. The cotton market was, last week, uncommonly animated. The aggregate sales amounted to not less than 22,550 bags, at an advance of 4s. per lb. on the prices of the preceding week. Of this large quantity, not more than 4,000 bags were bought on speculation, and 2,000 for export; the remainder, consisting of 16,000 bags was taken for home consumption. The import, up to Thursday, has been very small, amounting to 2,721 bags only; but a considerable quantity arrived on Friday and Saturday, the wind having, on those days, been favourable for arrivals from America. The demand for colonial produce has also been good during the latter part of the week. With respect to the export trade: we understand that more merchandise is now shipping for the foreign market, than has been shipped for some time past; and that there is every prospect of the quantity gradually increasing. We sincerely rejoice at the brightening aspect of the commercial horizon, and confidently hope, that the gloom which has so long prevailed will be quickly dissipated by the beams of returning prosperity.
