STATE OF TRADE, DUBLIN.—In consequence of a resolution which we learn was entered into on Saturday last, by the Relief Committee, from the scantiness of the funds in their possession, to reduce the wages of the unfortunate weavers who have been employed in making roads in the vicinity of Dublin, six-pence per day, many hundreds of them assembled on Monday, in the neighbourhood of the circular road, and came in a body into the City; they made a formidable, but at the same time, a most affecting and melancholy appearance: many of them held their squalid children by the hand, and poverty and despondency to such an extent was depicted in their countenances, as to be sufficient to excite the commiseration of any person whose heart was not callous to the sufferings of his fellow-creatures. In passing through Westmoreland-street, Dame-street, &c. to the Royal Exchange, where they purposed to

present a petition to the Committee, they distributed a printed handbill to the following effect:—
 "Fellow Citizens—Do not be the least surprised at seeing so many of your fellow citizens rambling through your city, in order to ask, whether you have given your sanction for us poor Road-makers, to be reduced from one shilling to sixpence per day? Give us bread for our children; so of the two evils choose the least, for rely on it we will billet them where there is something to eat."
 "Dublin, August 7th, 1826"
 Between two and three o'clock they arrived at the Royal Exchange. About half past four, there being no answer given to their memorial, they became impatient. Mr. Houghton, a respectable manufacturer, residing in Celbridge, on leaving the Exchange, was hooted by them. Mr. Houghton did not know the cause of it; he retired into Mr. Grierson's shop in Parliament-street; from thence he

was escorted by some of the Police to the Head office. The reason assigned by those unfortunate people for manifesting displeasure towards Mr. Houghton, was from their understanding that Mr. Houghton was the person who moved the resolution for the reduction of their miserable daily pittance. Mr. Houghton stated in the Police office that they were totally mistaken on that point—that he did not move any such resolution.
 About five o'clock they began to depart from the Exchange in different parties; some of them went up Usher's quay, and forced open a bakery; others adopted the same course to get provisions in Thomas street, Francis street, the Coombe, Meath street &c.; but the largest number assembled in James's street, and with stones or brick bats attacked the bakery of Mr. Manders. Four of them were in different places, taken into custody. Before seven o'clock however, by the

activity of the police, they were all dispersed. We will not attempt to be the apologists for excesses committed under any circumstances, but surely the wretched situation of those unfortunate beings and their families, is enough to drive them to desperation. Is there a man who has a shilling or a guinea to spare, that should not come forward and render those men in some way or other assistance? If those who possess means be not actuated by feelings of humanity, they should be by motives of duty, for it is impossible to say in what way they may be visited by the effects of the "distress of the poor."

The *Journal of the Two Worlds* has the following article in the number of the 18th July:—"The Mexican Government has forbidden all English ships of the Royal Navy to anchor under the fort of St. Juan d'Ul-lua, or even to moor there: but they may do both at the Isle of Sacrificios.—It seems that this measure has been suggested by the fear that they may attempt to seize upon it, and make it another Gibraltar. Whether these fears are well founded or not, it is certain that the city of Vera Cruz has asked of the Government that this fort should be demolished, but this request has been rejected.

PREMIUMS.

The following Premiums have been voted by the "Society for the encouragement of Arts, Manufactures, and Commerce":
Cultivation of Hemp in Upper and Lower Canada, Nova Scotia and New-Brunswick.
 To the person who shall sow with hemp the greatest quantity of land in the above-mentioned provinces, not less than six arpents, (each four-fifths of a statute acre) in the year 1826, and shall at the proper season cause to be plucked the summer hemp, (or male hemp bearing no seed,) and continue the winter hemp (or female hemp bearing seed) on the ground until the seed is ripe;—*the Gold Medal, or two Hundred Dollars.*
 To the person who shall sow with hemp the next greatest quantity of land in the same provinces, not less than five arpents, in the year 1826, in the manner above-mentioned;—*the Silver Medal, or One Hundred Dollars.*
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
