Such an advantage is palpable to the understanding of every colonist, and must prevent even a factious man from saying or imagining that the connexion with Great Britain is only felt by its inconveniences. I am far from insinuating that this connexion is valued principally for such a reason. The just and liberal government of the mother country, and particularly of late years, has established it, as well by the ties of interest as of affection; and it is the hope and wish of the colonies that it may long continue, as in all probability it will.

Thus, it appears, the natural advantages and rapid advancement of this colony offer every thing to invite emigration, which the political importance of its situation seems almost to demand. The emigrant, instead of a pauper, becomes a proprietor; instead of hearing the revolting doctrine, of checking population, every thing about him encourages the principle more consistent with the first law of nature, and the first precept of Revelation, "to increase and multiply;" he leaves a sufficient provision for his children, and even grows rich with the growth of the country. The proposed plan I earnestly hope will be executed gradually on an extensive scale, and I believe it will add to the stock of national wealth and human happiness.

CORONATION OF THE EMPEROR NICHOLAS.

We learn by intelligence from Moscow that the ceremony of the Imperial Coronation took place, in that city on the 22d ult., (Sunday, the 3d inst.) That part of the Kremlin, where the procession passed was entirely closed, and a scaffolding erected, the seats on which varied from twenty five to seventy five rubles. The ancient Cathedral, which is very small, could not contain at the utmost, above five hundred spectators, and of these scarcely one-fourth were accommodated with seats. Discharges of artillery announced the completion of the ceremony to the multitudes. The Grand Duke Constantine, who arrived at Moscow a few days before the Coronation took place, assisted at the ceremony, and walked in the procession. The city was illuminated during three successive evenings. The towers of the Kremlin were one blaze of lamps. The impression produced on the Russian nobility by the entertainments given by the Duke of Devonshire, has been that of admiration. Preparations had been making for a ball to be given by his Grace, at which the Imperial family were to be present. Tickets were issued for five hundred persons, and it was to take place on the 7th (16th) inst.

ST. PETERSBURGH, SEPT. 4.

Accounts from Kasan, of the 27th July say that after a continuance of extremely hot weather for many weeks, accompanied

with a thick fog, which made the sun look like a ball of fire, a dreadful thunder storm burst over the city, on the 10th of July, six in the afternoon, by which considerable damage was done, two sentinels were killed, and the lightning struck several buildings, among others the Church of Our Lady of Tifne. The persons in the Church were thrown down, but though none were hurt, some women and old men have been ill from the fright.

The water in the Wolga has fallen considerably this year, islets have appeared in some places, and the river is retiring from its left bank, which confirms the conjecture of some persons, that the Wolga formerly flowed near the elevation in the town of Kasan itself, then by the village of Ometeva, the Monastery of the Insurrection, and so on in the same direction.
