**IRELAND.**

Hitherto the elections in Ireland have favoured the return of the friends to the Catholic claims. Roscommon is the solitary instance of an advocate for that cause being ousted by the opposite party. The excitable spirit of the Irish has been arrayed in the feeling of partizanship, rather than of principael; and the small freeholders have dared to vote in the interests opposed to their landlords. The Beresfords have no chance of success, and are treated with the warmest hate of an Irish mob. Mr. O'Connell has, by his eloquent appeals, wrought upon the prejudices or feelings of the Irish Catholics with astonishing success. He appears as the friend of Mr. Stewart, the competitor of Lord G. Beresford, Galway is remarkable for the strenuous & indignant resistance of the freeholders to an attempt on the part of Lord Clancardes agents to elect his nominee. Monaghan, Kerry, Armagh, and almost every place of election, have been the scenes of riot and conflict of the severest kind. The most fatal consequences have resulted from them; at Monaghan, one individual was killed and twenty-three were wounded. In the county of Kerry, Lord Ennismore has introduced the novel scheme of police surveillance over his own friends, who have been barracked. Lord Ventry's tenants were also brought in under the guard of police, with magistrates riding at their head. Colonel Crosbie's freeholders had previously arrived in a large body with flags. The parties met, and a scuffle immediately ensued. A party of the Rifle Brigade had been previously placed in the Corn Store, and orders were given to them and to the police to fire. Six men were shot dead, and as many more wounded—two of the men were shot in their own house, and a father and son in the street. Colonel Crosbie told Lord Ennismore his conduct in ordering out the military was ruffianly and instantly horsewhipped him. A curious circumstance, showing the discriminative power of electors, has occurred at Armagh. The epithet "Judas," has been applied by the Orange party to Mr. Brownlow, on account of his departure from their principles; many of the poor freeholders, brought in for the express purpose of supporting Brownlow, not knowing the import of the name, follow him, shouting, "Judas

Brownlow! Judas Brownlow for ever! Down with the Orangemen—up with Judas." Some of them insisted upon voting for him under this flattering cognomen.

A CURIOSITY. A lady in this town a few days since, laid out some linen on the grass to whiten, and on taking it up, found to her astonishment a number of flowers elegantly painted on it. A second time the same magical picture was stamped upon the linen, which led to the discovery of the fair painter. It is found to be a little worm which diligently labored till he had produced the flower and then died. The flowers are large, perfectly regular and variegated. The color of the center is yellow, the foliage of a dusky brown. Naturalists can probably give some further account of this little Embroiderer. *Haverhill Gazette.*
