PROVINCIAL AUDITOR'S OFFICE Fredericton, 9th Aug. 1826.

ALL Persons who have received and who have not yet accounted for the Expenditure of any public monies entrusted to their care and expenditure, are hereby required to make up and transmit their several Accounts (post paid) to this office duly attested, and with the proper Vouchers in their support, by the first day of December next, or their Defaults will be reported to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor as directed by the Act of Assembly "for the better examining and auditing the Public Accounts of this Province."

The Accounts must be stated Dr. & Cr. with the Province, and the warrants credited each separately, and the purpose for which granted. The payments made must have distinct Vouchers applying to each Charge and corresponding in number and Amount. The Accounts must state whether any and what parts of the work have been done by Contract, also the names of the Contractors, the nature of the contract, whether by the rod or other distance, or so much for the whole, or in what other way? how the Contract has been performed and what sums have actually been paid?---If done by Days-

work to state the names of the workmen, the rate of wages per day of each man whether found in provisions or not? the number of days which each man has worked, the amount paid to each man, the quantity of work done, and the mode in which the same has been performed; The proper receipts must accompany the accounts of all monies paid by the commissioners, and (if the same are Signed with a mark) they must be witnessed by at least one respectable witness:---The Commissioners Account must be attested to before a Justice of the Peace, and the Oath must be in the following form, or to that effect viz. "We A. B. & C. D. the Commissioners within named do make Oath that the foregoing Account is correct and true, and that the several sums therein mentioned as paid have actually been paid by us as therein stated"

SEDUCTION AND SUICIDE.

From a London Morning Paper.

The sympathies of the inhabitants of Hamstead and its neighbourhood, have been powerfully excited by one of those melancholy cases of self destruction which so frequently occur to startle the public ear. Many of the details have not yet transpired; but diligent inquiry has brought us acquainted with the following affecting particulars:--

The unhappy victim, who had not reached her 17th year, was the daughter of a Mr. Thomas Hynde, a highly respectable farmer, residing not far from Hampstead Muir. It appeared, about four months ago, she had the misfortune to become acquainted with a Captain Nichols, of the Dragoon Guards, at the house of a relative of hers in the city. This gentleman having long mingled in the polished society of the west end, and possessing an intelligent countenance and a handsome figure, affected to be struck with the beauty and accomplishments of Miss Hynde, and contrived to be introduced by her to the family at Hampstead. There his attentions became so evident, and his assiduities so marked, that Mr. Hynde thought it prudent to come to an immediate explanation; and that was apparently satisfactory, for the Captain continued his visits more frequently than formerly. Female confidence in a soldier's honour is known to be excessive; and Miss Hynde apparently reposed herself in the fullest manner on that of Capt. Nichols.

Things went on quietly enough until Wednesday se'night, when the young lady agreed at the urgent solicitation of her admirer, to accompany him to the English Opera House. They remained in the theatre till nearly half past nine o'clock when on pretence that by staying longer they would lose the Hampstead coach, they left the place, and proceeded at a rapid pace towards the Haymarket. Before the poor girl knew well in what direction she was going, she found herself in an obscure alley of Leicester square. How the Captain reconciled her to accompany him to such a place is and must remain a mystery; but from the accounts that have transpired,
