

the present is not the proper season for assembling their body, and express how desirous they are that Bolivar should continue to retain his power until the country be in a more organized state.

It is probable that the dissolution of the Congress will cause great general discontent, but people dare not express their sentiments openly, being awed by the Army, which is devoted to him, and is commanded by Columbian chiefs.

Bolivar is said to have in view great plans: some surmise that he is desirous to unite all South America and Mexico, in one great confederation, if not in one great empire; others think that it is his intention to unite under one Government the Republic of Peru, of which Lima is the capital, with the provinces of Upper Peru, which form the new Republic called the Republic of Bolivia, which comprises Potosi, Charcas, Cochabamba, La Paz, Moxos, and Chiquitos, provinces that formerly pertained to the Viceroyalty of Buenos Ayres.

Bolivar seems to be impressed with the opinion that the Holy Alliance will not desist from their scheme of suffocating the pretensions to freedom and independence that these countries have set up, and it is thought that the Emperor of Brazil may receive assistance and countenance from his father-in-law the Emperor of Austria.

ing fast in my eye, a part projecting out (the same eye that the breech of the gun was taken from); it was so fast there that it was with difficulty that I got it out, when the blood poured out in streams. There was no one with me at the time. My son Edward then came to me and seeing the situation I was in, he was much affrighted and he ran to fetch his mother. She in a fright, asked what she must apply to it (meaning I suppose, to stop the blood). I immediately answered that there was work for a doctor, and wished for one to be sent for instantly. She asked what doctor I would have. After hesitating a moment, I mentioned Mr. Parry, of Mold. I think the blood was nearly stopped before the doctor came. When he came he began to search my eyes, in one of which he found and brought out the head and part of a screw pin, and likewise several pieces of the gun-stock. He then dressed the wounds, and I was put in bed, where I lay about three weeks before I was able to get up. The doctor (Mr. Parry) attended me daily for twenty-six days, and afterwards every other day, till the middle of August, when he told me that he could do no better for me than I could do myself. In this situation poor Peters remained until the month of April last. So great were his sufferings that he often earnestly prayed to God for his release, and frequently took leave of his family on going to bed at night, in the hope that his sufferings would terminate before morning. About that time he felt something in his eye, which he and his family thought was a piece of bone. His landlord, Mr Mather, of Pentre-hobin, procured him a recommendation to the Chester Infirmary; into which he was admitted, and, after subjecting him to proper regimen and medicine, the above piece of iron was extracted, without any difficulty, on the third day, by merely distending the eyelids, so as to ease the shoulder of the thick end which presented itself. The man is now as well in health as he ever was in his life, and highly grateful for the benefit he has derived from his reception into the Infirmary. He is completely blind of both eyes; although he says he sometimes fancies that he can distinguish day from night with that which was least injured by the accident. - Chester Courant.

LONDON, Oct. 7.

We understand that the editor of a Glasgow Newspaper had an interview on Tuesday, with the Chancellor of the Exchequer, for the purpose of enquiring whether any, and what measures, were intended to be taken by Government to relieve the distresses of the Manufacturing Operatives of the West of Scotland. Mr. Robinson, in the course of his remarks, paid a high compliment to the excellent conduct of the manufacturing population of Scotland, in the midst of their privations; of which he said, government were deeply sensible. Certain measures were in contemplation for their relief; but it would be improper and premature to mention what these measures were, as interested speculators might take advantage of their publicity. He allowed that the average nett amount of the duty on printed goods were not more than £400,000; while the amount collected was upwards of £1,200,000. But he declined, for the reasons already mentioned, to state what were his intentions regarding this Tax. The tenor however, of his observations, was decidedly encouraging to the Manufacturing interests.
