THAT whereas Lieut. Arthur Walsh, on the Half Pay of the Royal West India Rangers, informed Mr. Moses Shaw, formerly of Lepiteaux, in this Province, now resident at Moose River, Nova Scotia; that William George Llewellyn was Heir to an entailed Estate of £5000 sterling per annum, and £35,000 in Bank and Funds, but was not acquainted with a

willed property left William George Llewellyn—that Lieut. Arthur Walsh also informed Mr. Moses Shaw, that he had seen letters from Wm. George Llewellyn's brothers, and particularly from his sister, wife of Lieut. Col. Blackburne, Esq. of the Hon. East India Company's Service—and that Lieut. Arthur Walsh further informed Mr. Joseph Shaw, (eldest son of Mr. Moses Shaw) at Magagaudavic, residing at Grenville, near the Ferry, N. S. that Wm. Geo. Llewellyn was the heir at Law to a property in England, and was caused to be sent out on Foreign Service in the R. W. I. Rangers, by his own brothers, and particularly by his sister, Mrs. Mary Ann Blackburne. I call on Lieut. Arthur Walsh to corroborate the same.

Any Reference to my brother Mr. H. Llewellyn, Stationer, Librarian Rochester Terrace, Stoke Newington, County of Middlesex, England, as he is in full possession of my Father's papers and documents,—did live at Stoke Newington Sept. 1814.

Any reference to my Brother-in-law Wm. Blackburne Esq. at his Cousin's John Blackburne Esq. M. P. No. 2 Park Street Westminster, London, as that Gentleman is in full possession of all particulars.

That Mr. Henry Llewellyn, Stationer, & Librarian, Rochester Terrace, Stoke Newington, in the Co. of Middlesex, England, and who lived there in September, 1814, wrote out to St. Lucia, West Indies, to Captain John Knox, Esq. R. W. I. Rangers, that his brother Wm. George Llewellyn's aunt, Mrs. White, my deceased Father's Sister, left Wm. George Llewellyn, in her will, £9,000, chiefly personal, in Plate, and Jewels, paying one thousand pounds sterling out to old Servants interested in the said Will of Mrs. White, who died at Mallock, Derbyshire, England, and interred there, Nov. 1815.

Mr. Henry Llewellyn's letter to Capt. J. Knox, Esq. was in London, Oct. 1816. I call on Mr. Henry Llewellyn to corroborate the same, the Captain's Company I served in as a Private Soldier in the R. W. I. Rangers.

I also refer to my Sister, Mrs. Mary Ann Blackburne, wife of Lieut-Col. Wm. Blackburne, of the 12th Native Infantry, Madras, East Indies.

I call on Mrs. Mary Ann Blackburne to corroborate the same—her residence at No. 2 Park-Street, Westminster, London.

Any reference to my youngest brother, Mr. Thomas Llewellyn, Tallow Chandler, Greek Street, Soho, London, near Soho Square.

A reference to Mr. Wm. Rydyards, Rathbone Place, Glanville Street, London, did live there Sept. 1814,—my Mother's brother.

A reference to Henry Hall, Esq. Card-Maker to her late Majesty, No. 25 Piccadilly, London. There were two gentlemen, Mr. H. Hall informed me, called on him, to make enquiry for the family. Mr. Hall likewise informed me there were two other gentlemen, one from the Bank of Eng. the other from the Court of Chancery, who told him there was a very heavy Budget left the Eldest Son of John Llewellyn, Esq. Wm. George Llewellyn, and asked Mr. H. Hall if he knew where I was, he Mr. Hall

told him I was a soldier in His Majesty's 102nd Regiment of Foot. The gentlemen told Mr. H. Hall I must be bought out immediately, for nothing could be done without me. I call on Mr. Hall to corroborate the same.

A reference to John Newberry, Esq. 54 Upper Mare-le-bone Street, Fitzroy-square, London, as he is well acquainted with the family.

Wm. George Llewellyn late Pensioner of His Majesty's 102nd Regt. of Foot, commanded by Lieutenant-General Francis Gross, Esq. by order of His Royal Highness the Duke of York, at that time Commander-in-Chief, (in 1812.) His Royal Highness the Duke of York ordered me one Shilling per day, on the 17th day of March, 1813, at the Royal Hospital, Chelsea, near London.
