His Excellency the Lieut. Governor arrived in St. John on Tuesday last, and we regret to observe that His Excellency was at that time rather indisposed, but are happy to add that he is stated to have considerably recovered since his arrival.

The sale of Crown Lands, advertised in our Gazette a fortnight since for yesterday, took place accordingly at the Market-House; and although, as we understand, this was one of the minor sales, upwards of 3000 acres were disposed of. We have been informed that the Commissioner of Crown Lands intends going shortly to St. John and to St. Andrews, for the purpose of ascertaining the expediency of selling Crown Lands in those quarters. After

his return to Fredericton he also intends proceeding to Woodstock, and thence to Miramichi for the same purpose.

The Public will observe by an Advertisement in to days Gazette, that a Reward of Fifty Pounds has been offered since the 10th instant, for the conviction of some person or persons unknown, who committed a most outrageous attack upon the Indian

"Captain Francis" during the night of Tuesday the 7th instant, or the morning of Wednesday the 8th, as it would seem with an intent against his life; and we sincerely trust the offender or offenders will be speedily brought to justice. The enormity of the crime is considerably aggravated when the well known honest and peaceable disposition of Captain Francis is considered; and no language can be too harsh or punishment too severe for him who would thus "shed man's blood." Under such circumstances it is the paramount duty of Society to use their best efforts to bring the perpetrators of such offences to the proper tribunal: and we therefore most earnestly hope that the liberal reward of the Commissioners for Indian Affairs, will be only a secondary consideration. It is in fact the duty of every good christian and well wisher to the reputation of the Province, to root out from amongst us crimes of so atrocious a character, especially when practised upon a poor and unoffending race of Indians.

We had an opportunity on Friday last of personally observing the state of the Crops in the Parish of Douglas, and we are happy to say, that from every appearance, the Farmers in that part of the Country will no doubt this year reap an abundant harvest: and it gives us additional pleasure to add, from the Agricultural Reports, that the same favourable prospects exist throughout the Province generally. The early Wheat appears to be the only thing about which the slightest fear is entertained—this is we believe in consequence of the late heavy and unseasonable rains having produced a partial rust amongst it. But perhaps the husbandmen do not consider, that, while they will, in all likelihood, sustain a trifling diminution in the quantity of Wheat, they will probably have such an abundance of every thing else as seldom fell to their lot for many previous years. The quantity of hay that will be cut this year, when contrasted with last, almost exceeds belief. A small piece of Intervale on which not more than five tons were cut last year, has this given about sixteen! and in some other parts of the Province, we understand, it is in much greater proportions!! The Potatoes, Indian Corn, Buckwheat, &c. &c. are every where in most promising condition.

There is now no necessity, we think, for any further arguments to prove the advantages of a diligent cultivation of the soil over the late speculations in lumbering...they are in fact become too manifest to leave even a single doubt on the minds of the most sceptical; and the present year, in particular, speaks volumes in support of this opinion: For if the capabilities of the Country are so striking when (comparatively speaking) unassisted by the art and industry of Man, what bountiful profits might it not produce, if that unremitting care and attention were bestowed upon it which its vast and almost incalculable resources so irresistibly (one would think) invite?

We cannot here omit noticing the good advice given to the Emigrant, in the City Gazette of the first instant—to the effect, that, upon his arrival in this Country, he should not linger in doubt and idleness about the Town, but make the proper application and go directly to the interior, and, like a truly wise man, fulfil the intention of his journey.

No advice could be more correct and friendly, and none but the worthless, we conceive, will reject it.

We shall expect with much confidence the gratifying results of the present Agricultural prospects, when we may offer some further observations on this most interesting and important subject.

An extraordinary sensation has been created in the world of fashion, by an attempt of Mr. Gallatin's Coachman, to break the line of carriages at Almack's,....a Police Officer having seized the minister's horses by the head to prevent such a breach of etiquette, Jehu, who was a genuine English Whip, repaid his officiousness with several cuts on the shoulders, for which he was taken before a Magistrate. Mr. Gallatin appeared, to plead in his defence the law which forbids the arrest of Foreign Ministers and their servants, but the Attorney General gave it as his opinion that the statute did not extend to positive breaches of the peace. The high priestesses of this celebrated shrine of fashion are said to be so insensed at the outrage, that fears are entertained that it will prevent the accomplishment of the object of Mr. Gallatin's mission to England, and that he will be forced to return without making any arrangement with respect to the Colonial Trade.

SUMMARY.

The Lord Bishop of Canada has given £100 towards erecting a Protestant Episcopal Church at the new City of Guelph, in Upper Canada.

His Grace the Duke of Manchester sailed from Kingston, (Jam.) for England on the 2d July, in H. M. ship Rattlesnake, Captain Leith; and on the following day Sir John Keane, K. C. B. was sworn in as Lieutenant-Governor of the Island.

Lord Dalhousie has dissolved the House of Assembly, and directed writs to be issued for assembling a new one.

At Kingston (Canada) there appears to have been some disturbance on the 12th. That day being the anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne, it was celebrated by the Irish Orange Lodge, by a procession. A great number of the Irish labourers on the Canal assembled to prevent or interrupt the procession. The civil power was insufficient to preserve the peace. Stones were thrown, and pistols fired on both sides. Several persons were severely injured. The military were afterwards called out, and tranquillity restored.

The population of the U. S. is said to increase at the rate of 1000 per day, 365,000 a year.

The Duke of St. Albans was to marry Mrs. Coutts on the 12th.

Spain is represented as being fearfully convulsed.

The Emperor of Russia has issued a proclamation complaining of disorders and secret associations in Poland.

A later letter from Caracas states that Bolivar has quelled the counter revolution in Guayaquil, and arrested the ringleaders.

The Mexican minister of Finance has been ordered to leave the country; he was sent to Vera Cruz, and only allowed 48 hours to find a passage.

Great damages have been done in nearly every part of France by inundations. The Municipality of Toulouse has voted 10,000 fr. for the relief of the sufferers by the late inundation in that town.

To allay the irritability occasioned by the loss of office, Mr. Dawson has been advised to devote himself to some literary pursuit, and he accordingly intends to edit a new edition of Paradise Lost.

The Bishop of Chichester, confirmed 2,500 persons last week at Sudbury, and at Bury 3,500.
