

and disappointed man finding a resting place where his labours were to yield him and family a future home, has with contentment, industriously commenced his work, and proved a useful settler. Some of those sent up, found labour in Shepody, and others, proving of very bad character, their supplies of provisions were stopt, and they have, I understand, left the Province. Eleven Families in all have left the settlement. It became necessary, however, for the Society to have recourse to other means of relief for those who were labouring under disease, and without shelter or food; accordingly a Provincial Hospital was established for their reception, in which 53 patients have been admitted, of whom 4 died; 94 discharged recovered, and 15 remain at present in the house. The expenditure attending those arrangements are stated in the Treasurer's account with the Society, now furnished for its information, by which it appears that the following sums have been expended:—

I would therefore suggest that a premium be offered for the best Essay on any subject connected with the objects of the Society; already attempts have been made to communicate information to the Farmers, and although the characters remain yet unknown, they must feel satisfied, from concurring testimony, that their labours have been useful and acceptable. To a country, there are no objects of more vital consequence than those in which we are engaged—Agricultural improvement, and melioration of the increasing population of the Colony. A various and industrious population is the source and evidence of prosperity. Agriculture is the element wherein it can best exert itself. Contentment and patriotism the result. In promoting this branch of our Country's policy, it has been our happiness to bear a part; we must not therefore lag in our perseverance, until we secure the great and beneficial ends of our organization; if our minds become apathetic, we may resolutely, that every thing around us will be neglected, until our concerns shrink to	

contrary, if we continue our labours with energy, success will crown our endeavours, and through that success we shall gain confidence in the capability of our soil, and our own powers to improve it. This will no doubt require a strenuous effort, but it is justly said, that men value most what is thus gained...they love their Country better because improved in a degree by their own talents and industry, and they identify with their interests those institutions, which have afforded them the means of securing comfort, independence, and the multiplied enjoyments of civilized life.
