EFFECTS OF DREAMING.

and making a rather more precipitate descent to the earth, than was found agreeable.

The man is supposed to be much bruised internally, but we have not heard that he is in imminent danger.

A Coroner's Inquest was held in the Parish of St. Mary's, on Thursday morning last, before William Taylor Esquire, on view of the body of Mrs. Rebecca White, (wife of Mr. Henry White of the Nashwalk) who was found dead on the road side near the residence of Captain Anthony Barker. She was on her way to visit her sister, who was dangerously ill, and is supposed to have been seized with a fit and expired instantly. Verdict—"Died by the visitation of God."

ST. JOHN, AUGUST 18.
FIRE!—The Inhabitants of this City were, between the hours of two and three this morning, alarmed by the cry of Fire!—It was discovered to be in the House of WILLIAM LALLY, nearly opposite Trinity Church, and, very fortunately, just in time to render the operations of the Fire Engines available:—It was got under before the building had sustained much damage.

On examining the Premises, it was found that they had been set on fire in seven different places. It was evident therefore that some incendiary had been at work, and as the furniture, bedding, &c. had only lately been removed, suspicion of course was immediately attached to Mrs. Lally herself, who was in the house at the time. She was immediately taken into custody, and this forenoon underwent an examination before Messrs. Aldermen PETERS, ANSLY, and HARRING. The witnesses who were examined produced strong evidence against the prisoner; but, being pretty much of a circumstantial nature only, she was committed to prison, to await a further examination.

It is impossible to tell the extent of the loss of property that would have ensued in this instance, had the fire baffled the exertions made to get it under, the property being surrounded by wooden buildings. We think too much vigilance, on the part of our City Authorities, cannot be used in order to bring to punishment those persons who are so thoroughly hardened as to put the lives and properties of the community in mere danger through wantonness.

On Thursday afternoon last H. M. Ship Barham, Capt. Sir John Lewis, Bart., arrived here from Jamaica. His Excellency, Alex. Cockburn, Esq., British Envoy to the Republic of Colombia, came passenger. SUMMARY.
JAMAICA.—(Extract of a letter from the North side, dated, July 9th.)—“There has been felt here lately a great scarcity of fish and provisions. The weather has been so uncommonly warm, that the crops of the Negroes have completely failed, and their owners are now compelled to furnish them with almost their entire food. Many of the estates have been unable to do this, as the scarcity was not foreseen and of course not provided for; and in consequence several Negroes had died from their having been compelled to eat too much fruit.”

BOSTON, July 27.—A small schooner, called the Mary Ann, Captain Flint, of Yarmouth, N. S. was seized, in this harbour on Wednesday, for a violation of the laws of the United States. She had in her hold 16 bbls of flour, and a quantity of corn was on the wharf, ready to be received on board. We understand the Captain states, that he arrived here in ballast, with some specie to purchase the above articles, and that he was ignorant of the prohibitory laws. The only paper he produced to the seizing officer was a permit, granted at the place the vessel belongs to, allowing him to receive on board, salt, and proceed on a fishing cruise of 4 months.

QUEBEC, JULY 19.
The first division of the 76th foot after nearly 14 years service in this country, embarked on Monday on board the KAINS, transport, on their return to Great Britain. Two Englishmen of distinction, one of them the brother of a Peer, have been murdered at Aleppo.
