NEW BRITISH MINISTRY.

The promptness of the King in the new organization of his Council, in consequence of the death of Mr. Canning, is the subject of general remark and approbation. Within ten days of the demise of his favourite Prime Minister, a new Cabinet has been nearly organized, and invested with the seals of office.

The following list of the Cabinet is said to be correct:—

First Lord of the Treasury.—Viscount Goderich, vice Mr. Canning.

Lord Chancellor—Lord Lyndhurst.

President of the Council—Duke of Portland, vice Lord Harrowby, resigned. [The Duke was Lord Privy seal.—His successor not named.]

Home Secretary—Marquis of Lansdowne, vice Mr. Bourn.

Foreign Secretary—Viscount Dudley and Ward.

Colonel and War Secretary.—Right Hon Wm. Huskisson late President of Board of Trade.—[On his travels on the Continent.]

Chancellor of the Exchequer—Rt. Hon. John C. Herries, late under Secretary of the Treasury, vice Mr. Canning.

President of Board of Trade—Right Hon. W. Sturges Bourne, late Home Secretary—vice Mr. Huskisson.

Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster—Lord Bexley.

Master of the Mint.—Right Hon. George Tierney.

First Commissioner of the Forests &c.—Earl of Carlisle.

Viscount Goderich, and Mr. Herries received the seals of office yesterday from the King, at Windsor. Lord Wm. Bentinck kissed hands yesterday on being appointed Governor General of India, and with Mr. Herries, were sworn in as Privy counsellors.

Mr. Huskisson has not yet arrived: by the last letters which have been received from the Right Hon. Gentleman, Mr. H. had arrived at Paris, where he contemplated staying two or three days, being fatigued from the effects of the journey. Mr. Huskisson will probably arrive in town to-morrow or on Tuesday.

Mr. HERRIES.—The statement which has appeared respecting this gentleman, in some of the daily papers, insinuating that his appointment to the office of Chancellor of the Exchequer had been stopped, by reason of a connection with an eminent capitalist, has received the most unqualified denial by Lord Goderich, in a letter which his Lordship wrote to Mr. Herries immediately on reading the article in the Morning Chronicle. "Copy of a letter from Lord Goderich to Mr. Herries.

"Downing street Aug. 24.

"My dear Herries,—In consequence of what appears in the Morning Chronicle of this day, I owe it to you to state, explicitly, the grounds assumed in that Paragraph for the delay in the appointment of Chancellor of the Exchequer, are totally destitute of foundation, and that they involve an imputation upon you which I shall be prepared at all times to deny in the most peremptory manner, be they asserted by whom they may.

Mr. Herries came to town yesterday, from Montreal, near Seven Oaks, Kent,

The "Exchequer Seal," or the Seal usually presented to these gentlemen holding the office of Chancellor of the Exchequer is not in the possession Mr. H., having been brought back by Lord Goderich from the Council at Windsor.

The Duke of Manchester has arrived in England from Jamaica. H. M. ship Undaunted is to carry to India, His Excellency Lord Wm. Bentinck, the Governor General.

The petition of the House of Assembly of Jamaica, passed on the 22d of December last, has been presented to His Majesty by the Marquis of Lansdown.

The King has written with his own hand an order to bestow on Mr. Stapleton, (Mr. C's. late private Secretary,) the vacant appointment of Commissioner of the Customs.

The receipts of the Custom-House, London, for three days in succession in the month of July, are said to have exceeded one hundred thousand pounds sterling each day.

At the Lincoln Assizes, three plaintiffs recovered damages from the Proprietors of the Graham steam-vessel for bodily injuries sustained by the explosion of the vessel's boiler. Verdicts £138, £75, £60, exclusive of costs.

The East India Company have presented the young Marquis of Hastings with twenty thousand pounds as an acknowledgment of the splendid and valuable services of his father in India.

Pitcairn's Island.—John Adams.—Extract of a letter from on board the Blossom, Capt Beechey:—"We left Valparaiso on the 29th of October, 1825, and ran down the trade-wind till we made Pitcairn's Island, where only one of the much-talked of mutineers of the Bounty now remains. On approaching, we were hailed by a whale-boat, with 'what ship, a how?' and soon after a respectable and reverend looking person, the patriarch of the place, John Adams, stepped up the side and cordially saluted us all. The same was done by his followers, the offspring of himself and his companions, whom he has trained up in habits of exemplary order, morality and virtue. From this time till our quitting the island, our employment was very agreeable, in visiting them ashore, and walking over the high cliffs, beautifully wooded with a great variety of trees, the most conspicuous of which are the cocoa-nut, cloth-tree, &c. After our day's fatigues we were excellently regaled with roasted pigs, and the finest yams in the world. The whole number of inhabitants does not exceed sixty or thereabouts; but the population is increasing so rapidly, that Adams confessed he felt considerable alarm lest the produce should become insufficient for their support. From morning to night they were almost constantly at prayers, and appeared surprised that we were not the same. We left them in December, leaving a good stock of presents."

From the Halifax Journal, Oct. 1.

We are sorry to learn by arrivals from the West-Indies, that severe hurricanes had been experienced in several of the Islands, from the 17th to the end of August: at Antigua 14 or 15 vessels, principally small craft belonging to the port, were driven on shore and several bilged; two or three drifted out to sea. Great damage was also done to the plantations and buildings on shore, the largest trees were torn up by the roots and hurled to a considerable distance; the gale was also experienced at Dominica, but not so serious as at Antigua; the schr. Experiment of Lunenburg, was driven on shore, with a few barrels of mackarel, and 15 puncheons of rum on board. At Martinique eleven vessels were driven on shore, six of which were English and American.
