that had raised expectations, which ought not, as has been observed, to have been raised, unless the authorities from whom those acts and declarations emanated, were prepared to follow them up.

I would not run against the feelings any more than I would against the interests of England. But if, looking to the character and extent of that resistance, I am asked whether I despair of the ultimate success of the question, I answer, that I do not despair that the good sense of the English people from candid discussion and repeated consideration of it, notwithstanding mere factious resistance to the claims themselves, will ultimately concede those claims.

The plan was refused by those whom it embraced, and another prepared in its stead, to which I could not have acceded, without, at the same time, recording my acknowledgement that the opinions of my past political life, upon one of the most important of all the questions which I have ever been called on to consider, furnished a justifiable ground of exclusion from any sort of participation in the government which this latter proposal was to organize.

By the late arrivals from England we are enabled to inform our Readers that the Committee of the House of Commons have strongly recommended to that House the measure heretofore spoken of, of Colonization from the Mother Country to these Provinces, and that a sum has been voted, to carry this system into effect; and we understand that in consequence of the very favourable impression made upon Colonel Cockburn in his late tour through this Province, of its capabilities and inducements for settling, that immediate steps will be taken to make preparation for the reception of such persons as His Majesty's Government may think proper to send out.

The Central point of disembarkation will, we understand, be Shediac, owing to the depth of water in its Harbour.

Assured, as we have been, of the Selection of the persons permitted to come to these Colonies under the sanction of His Majesty's Government, we see ample cause for congratulating the Public on the expectation of a considerable increase to the Population of the Province, which must necessarily lead to the extension of Agriculture among us; as well as on the influx of capital which will thus be gradually introduced and scattered among the labouring classes of the Community. To Settling and Cultivation we must look for founding the permanent prosperity of the Colony, and even tho' the application be, for the present, necessarily limited and partial, the benefit will be generally diffused.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor returned to Fredericton last Wednesday Morning, in His Yacht, from a Visit to the Grand Lake, having been absent from the Seat of Government twelve days. We understand His Excellency has expressed himself highly pleased with that interesting portion of the Province, both as regards its eligibility for Settlement and Cultivation, as well as for the fair Specimen of Coal, Slate, and Stone, which appears to be in such abundance.

His Excellency has, we are informed, with that consideration he has ever exhibited for the rising importance of New Brunswick, established several Schools in the remote parts of the Grand Lake and Salmon-River, and has liberally afforded, in His Majesty's name, pecuniary aid for the erection, and towards the completion, of Churches in the Parishes of Waterborough
