LONDON SEPT. 9.

The Ministry is now arranged, and our readers will learn all the particulars about it by referring to the following Court Circular.

It appears by the last accounts from Constantinople, that the Sultan was disposed to resort to harsh measures against the Ambassadors of England, France, and Russia, if they dare to present the Convention entered into by their respective Courts for the pacification of Greece. The threat of his Sublime Majesty extended to the committal of the Ambassadors to the Seven Towers, and it is insinuated that the dread of this outrage had induced Mr. Stratford Canning, who had received his copy of the Treaty, not to present it until the French Ambassador should receive his also, when the three would act simultaneously, and mitigate the rage of the Sultan by their combined strength. This conduct is not only prudent but necessary, for unity of action will give greater force to their remonstrance, and may be the means of their attaining the desired end without having recourse to more energetic measures.

The intelligence from Greece, is rather of a gratifying nature. Redschid Pacha had gone to Acarnania, where he had effected nothing. The Greeks having placed their wives and children within the natural fastnesses of the country, followed his movements and intercepted his supplies, so as to prevent him from venturing to any distance from the coast. Ibrahim Pacha, through a similar reason, had been obliged to retire to Modon and Canoe, from whence he had despatched two European officers to Zante, to buy provisions, with several Egyptian vessels of war to guard the convoy. This was the flotilla which Lord Cochrane attacked and defeated, as we stated some time since—an exploit which had increased the terrors of his name throughout the Levant, and imparted proportionate courage and ardour to the Greeks.

LONDON, SEPT. 6.

The Gazette de France, of Saturday, contains a letter from Trieste, 20th Aug.

which states, on the authority of advices from Corfu of the 5th, "that Lord Cochrane fell in on the 1st of that month, with a division of the Turkish fleet off Zante, and attacked it with such impetuosity that the Turks were obliged to fly, leaving eight men of war in his hands. On the 2d Lord Cochrane sailed with his prizes for Castile Tornese."
