ENGLAND AND THE UNITED STATES.

It is not unknown to politicians on either side of the Atlantic, that discussions have been for a considerable time carried on between this government and the United States, involving points of no mean importance. The slovenly and disgraceful manner in which the provincial treaty of 1783 was framed by a negociator, who thought he had no higher duty than to receive whatever law the high reaching sagacity and proud security of Franklin thought proper to impase upon him, left the newly-formed republic in possession of an immense territory beyond the frontiers of the confederated Provinces—a territory for which they had never thought of contending, and which would probably never have been asked from Great Britain, but for the contrast which could not fail to suggest itself to the mind of one of the most subtle men on earth, between his own qualifications for the office of bargain driving and the utter unfirness of the personages selected by the British Minister to oppose him. By this treaty the boundary lines between the United States and the remaining colonies of England were placed in much ambiguity-a circumstance no less convenient to the power, which might be afterwards in a condition to meditate the advancement of claims to still more extensive dominion, than it was unfavourable to that State whose local interests recommended to her a moderate and defensive policy. Ward, and Jacob Howland, to me duly made ac-1783, was far ourshone in 1815, by that of Mr. Coulburn his brother peace maker, in that ever memorable performance, the treaty which they signed at Ghent. After a disastrous war, the former had subscribed to terms which bespoke the consciousness of heavy national visi ations, and of pretentions proportionably humahed. The second batch of diploma ists had no such excuse to plead. They came to the parley after a could ct which, however meanly conducted on the part of the Bruish Ministers, left England absolute inistress of the terms on which she would condescend to treat. She had crushed an enemy in Europe the most form dable that xis ed. She had all the old world for her incimate friends and allies on that side therefore there was nothing to apprenend. In America she had expensed before it w thriegns a single che k which might have been redressed by a division of any given five thousand men, frem among an hundred thousand trained and victorious, veterans.
