

your memorialists might expect from its revival appears remote and inadequate, and must be intercepted by others; and since the second, the change in our laws of navigation, is fixed by treaties with Foreign Powers, your memorialists know not where to look for relief, except in the alleviation of the third, the duties on Colonial Wood. Such a measure your memorialists believe, without greatly impairing the Revenue, would be attended with most beneficial results, at once to the Colonial, the manufacturing, and the shipping interests. Your memorialists therefore must humbly pray your Lordships' favourable consideration of these circumstances; and that your Lordships will be pleased to recommend to His Majesty's Government to make such a reduction of the duty upon timber from the North American Colonies, as will effectually protect and encourage a Trade which seems so important to the wealth and power of the British Empire. And your memorialists will ever pray &c.

In our number of the 10th instant we noticed a public meeting which had been convened at the request of the Inhabitants of the County of York, in the County Court House, on the Wednesday preceding, for the purpose of preparing an Address of condolence to His Majesty on the late calamity with which has pleased the Almighty to visit the Royal Family and the Nation, by the death of His Royal Highness the Duke of York:—The following is a copy of the Address, which circumstances prevented our inserting earlier.

TO THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY.
WE the Inhabitants of the County of York, in your Majesty's Province of New-Brunswick, convened at Fredericton in the said County, the seat of Government, your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, deeply impressed with sentiments of unfeigned sorrow, beg leave most respectfully to approach your sacred Majesty, and to express our sincere condolence on the melancholy event which has plunged your Majesty and the Royal Family, together with the whole Empire, in the most profound grief, by the death of your illustrious and beloved brother, His late Royal Highness the Duke of York and Albany. Tho' distant from England, we are ever animated with the warmest and most affectionate attachment to Her as the land of our forefathers, with which we feel our pride and happiness still to be connected under your Majesty's Government, and in whose prosperity or misfortunes we deeply participate. We feel, therefore, in common with the British Nation, the irreparable loss sustained by the death of your Majesty's Royal and lamented brother, by whose comprehensive genius, unceasing attention, and indefatigable labours, the Art was placed upon such an efficient footing, as enabled your Majesty successfully

to resist the gigantic efforts of a military despotism on the continent of Europe, and to restore peace and freedom to its oppressed Monarchs.

The Name and Title of our esteemed and departed Prince, bestowed upon the Seat of Government in this Province, and upon this County, will ever be cherished by us with affection.

We farther most humbly beg leave to express our admiration of the public conduct of our deceased Prince, which uniformly evinced him to be the firm and undeviating supporter of the constitution of his Country, and whose prudence and conciliatory disposition in his political life, endeared him to all parties, and obtained for him their admiration, attachment and respect.

That Almighty God may temper to your sacred Majesty and the Royal Family the decrees of His unerring wisdom, and that his mercies and his blessings may be shed abundantly around, and his gracious protection encompass your Majesty, is the sincere and fervent prayer of

Your Majesty's most dutiful and affectionate Subjects.

Signed by His Honor the Chief Justice on behalf of the resident Members of His Majesty's Council, the Clergy, Magistracy, Gentry, Merchants, and the Inhabitants generally.

Yesterday being the day appointed for the Anniversary of His Majesty's Birth, the Troops in this Garrison, with the Militia Artillery and Rifle Companies of York County, paraded on the Race Course at 12 o'clock; and on the arrival of His Excellency Major General Sir Howard Douglas, and Suite, a Royal Salute was fired, and a feu de joie in honor of the day.

Col. Cockburn, whose arrival we noticed in our last, has been appointed a Commissioner from England for the express purpose of collecting information and making such arrangements as may facilitate the reception and advantageous location of a large number of Settlers, which, in the event of an extensive system of colonization being finally determined on, we understand it is in the contemplation of His Majesty's Government to send to this Province; and we learn with great pleasure that it is the intention of Government to select for this purpose, persons of hardy and robust constitutions and unexceptionable character: We therefore congratulate our fellow subjects on the prospect of a measure which, we think, cannot fail to prove highly advantageous to New-Brunswick, in the cultivation, in a more extensive manner, of the real resources of the Country, and by making a valuable addition to its population and physical strength; and from hence we may foresee the consummation of those hopes and objects, to which our attention has been for some time past taught so anxiously to direct itself.

There is no new intelligence respecting the affairs of Spain and Portugal on which dependance can be placed. The last Mail has not brought any later dates than what we were in possession of before.

The general aspect of Trade in the manufacturing districts in England and Scotland is favorable.

SUMMARY.

The Legislature of Nova-Scotia was prorogued on the 17th inst. His Excellency the Lt. Governor, in the course of his Speech, regretted that the Session should have closed without an appropriation having been made for the encouragement of the

Fisheries, (the great staple of the Province.) His Majesty's Council have not agreed to the Bill for "granting permission to the President and Directors of the Shubenacadie Canal Company, to issue £10,000 in Notes under 30s.—Nova-Scotia Royal Gazette, April 18.

Liverpool, Feb. 8.—Am. Pine Timber, yellow, 15. 3/4 to 15. 6d. per foot. Sales have been forced at 15. 1d.

Major-General Sir John Keene, K. C. B. sailed from Portsmouth for Jamaica on the 10th of February.

Trade is said to have greatly improved in Scotland.

A Census of the Population of Nova Scotia is to be taken during the ensuing summer.

His Majesty has presented through Lord Melville a donation of £500 in aid of the new and magnificent building at present erecting—the High School in the metropolis of Scotland.

The state of affairs in the neighbourhood of Carlisle in the north of England is said to be in a most deplorable condition; the most daring outrages have been committed, and robberies of all descriptions prevail there every day.

A meeting was held on the 1st February, at Edinburgh, for the purpose of contributing towards the erection of a monument in that City to perpetuate the memory of His Royal Highness the Duke of York. The Town Council voted £100.

Liverpool, March, 16.—Our Corn Market is very dull, the prices declining, owing to the suspense as to the measure His Majesty's Ministers contemplated submitting to Parliament, which is now postponed to the 26th inst.

The King has called on Parliament to make suitable provision for the Duke of Clarence, now the heir presumptive to the Throne.

Bolivar has written a letter to the President of the Senate of Columbia abdicating the Presidency of the Republic.

It is reported a Plan of Catholic Emancipation has been prepared by some of the leading Protestants.

The British admiralty have it in contemplation to build six steam ships of the largest size, capable of carrying 100 canonade guns of increased calibre, and to be propelled by two engines of two hundred horse power each.

Nothing definitive has as yet transpired respecting the Colonial Trade or Boundary Line.

At Constantinople a new conspiracy had been discovered, and several of the leaders of it were seized in the night, and immediately executed.

We beg to direct the attention of our readers to an article on the Canada Lumber Trade, which will be found in this day's number. It is a Memorial of the British Merchants trading to the North American Provinces, on the subject of the Baltic Timber. It was to be presented to the Board of Trade about the end of January; and it is expected that Mr. Huskisson will take notice of it in his annual "Trade Speech," although the precise nature of his answer can hardly be anticipated.

Yesterday Colonel Cockburn, Vicount Valentia, and Dr. Hackett, left Fredericton for Miramichi.

ERRATA.—In an Act published in the Royal Gazette on the 23rd inst, intitled "An Act to repeal an Act intitled, "An Act to prevent the destruction of Sheep by Dogs," and to make other and more effectual provision for the prevention thereof," in the 9th and 10th lines of the second Section of the Act, in which the words "a Justice of the Peace" occur, erase such words, and read the passage without them.
In an Act published in the R. Gazette on the 17th instant, intitled "An Act to provide for

opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province," in the appropriation (at the commencement of the Act) of "the sum of six hundred and fifty pounds for the 'Great Road from Fredericton to the Canada Line,'" and in the appointed distribution of that money, and where it is stated that "the remaining sum of five hundred and fifty pounds be expended in improving the Great Road from thence to the Presque Isles" &c. read "two hundred and fifty pounds," &c.

NEW-YORK, APRIL 10.

The Ship Euphrates, arrived yesterday, sailed from Bangor, 25th Feb. and was nine days in the Channel with strong westerly gales. Capt. Smith was of opinion that vessels could not have sailed from Liverpool within that period.

Capt Smith has obligingly favored us with a Liverpool paper of the 24th, and London paper of the 23d of February.

The health of Lord Liverpool had amended, so that he was able to walk in his apartment. His restoration was now calculated upon.

Mr. Canning was expected to arrive at his House in Downing Street, on the 24th, and would be able to attend in Parliament on the following Monday.

The report of the death of the Duke of Cumberland was entirely false.

Mr. Huskisson was still unwell. The Speaker of the House of Commons was suddenly taken ill on the 22d, whilst presiding in his place. The House adjourned.
