His Excellency, with that tender solicitude which he has ever evinced for the welfare of the rising generation in this Province, has given directions that the Licence of this very unfit and unworthy person be immediately cancelled; and it is hoped that persons filling the responsible situation of Trustees of Schools in the different Parishes throughout the Province, will be parricularly careful to examine as well into the morals as into the qualifications of such persons as they may emplay in the education of Youth.

## SLAVE TRADE.

It appears by a private letter from an fficer of rank on the Coast of Africa, (who describes in strong language the excent to which the Slave trade is estied on by the Spanish and Portuguese vessels in the Bights of Benin, and Brafea,) that on the 6th of September, the Hope, schr. Lieutenant Tucker, was ordered to scour the Bight of Benin and examine more particularly Lago, Whydah and Bodagry. At Whydah there were no less than twelve vessels waiting for slaves, and for the yam season, and o take in their provisions; and one of these, a fine large new brig of 287 rons, and having on board 586 slaves, was captured by the Hope, after a gallant action of two hours and a half .- The following is an account of this spirited affair :- " One of those vessels (a fine brig of 278 tons) had just come over from Rio Janeuro, with her water filled, slave-deck laid, and farinha and yams on board. She was by her papers allowed to take 701 slaves. After examining her papers and hold, Lieurenant Tucker was sure she would be off in the course of a day or two, and, running out of sight, placed himself in a situation likely to pick her up. As he suspected, so it turned oute for the schooner was no sooner out of sight, than the monster who commanded the brigtook on board, in the course of three hours, her inhuman cargo of these poor ill-treated, heart-broken, unoffending slaves, and pus to sea with them, amounting, in men, women, and children, to 587. The next morning Tucker saw her, not far off, and, after a chase of twenty right hours, began an action with her, which was severely contested for two hours and a half, when he blove, having two of her guns dismouned. Tucker made up his mind to board he brig, he being at this time slighty wounded. Under a fire young man, a Mr. Pengelly, who headed the boarders, a harp coniest took place; but the rascals of P. ringuese, not much liking close quariers, and the rough marner our fine fellows reated them; called for quarter, and lald down their aims. Pergelly was shot in the de in b aiding, but went on. The brig had thirtien killed, and iwe've wounded ; while, thank God, our schoouer lost not a on, and had but Mr. Tucker, Mr. Pengelis, and one seamen, wounded. Five midrd and eight seven slaves were aptured; but I regret saying, three of here victims to Portuguese infamy were killed, and eleven wound d.
