

ed Colonies, its great usefulness and beneficial results, have been, and still continue to be, the best evidence of its enlightened principles. — It has also established Schools, the Reverend gentleman observed, in which thousands are constantly receiving the most useful instruction. The Report of its proceedings, last year, informs us that £62 3 87, have been expended in advancing the Gospel in the varied ways of instructing the young in Schools, the more aged from the Pulpit, and in disseminating the Holy Scriptures, Religious Tracts, &c. It appears that by late arrangements this Society contributes of its funds to the support of the other Society for propagating the Gospel in Foreign parts, and has transferred 15 Missions to that Society; but, as we understood the Doctor, "the Societies are one, although they divide the Labour;" and that therefore by contributing to the aid of one, both are partakers of the benefit. This the Doctor elucidated in a manner which reflected great credit upon himself for the pains he must have taken to collect his information, and upon the Venerable Societies that high reputation which their pious character so justly entitles them to.

We were not a little surprised to learn to what a vast sum the expenditure of these Societies amounts annually, within the Dioceses of Quebec and Nova Scotia, exceeding £30,000, a large proportion of which is laid out in this Province; and how little, (if any thing,) is afforded, either by the Colonial Governments, or contributions in other shapes, to lighten the weight of so great a burden. The United expenditure amounts to £107,000.

The collection in Church on the occasion in question (exclusive of other donations) amounted to £24 16 0.

Dreadful Accident.—About a week since, whilst a man by the name of Ritchie, a Mason, was assisting in quarrying stone a short distance from Fredericton, the rock suddenly blew up, by which we understand he lost both his eyes, and had his arm broken. This may have been the result of accident, but it should certainly operate as a serious caution to men engaged at that business, in future, to use those precautions which the dangerous tendency of the work always requires.

Fire.—On Sunday the 4th instant, between eleven and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, whilst the principal part of the Family were at public worship, the house of Mr James Banks, in Mougerville, took fire in the upper story, and before it was discovered, such was the rapidity of the devouring element, that in less than ten minutes the roof fell in; and in about three quarters of an hour after, the whole building was burnt to the ground. The greater part of Mr. B's. furniture and provisions were destroyed. His family consists of a wife, eleven children, and an aged mother, all of whom are by this fatal event, deprived of a home in this inclement season of the year.

We observe the Editor of the *Bangor Register*, in his number of the 31st ult., has entered a complaint against us for not sending him our Paper regularly. We can only assure him that it is always sent to the Post Office, properly directed, every week, and if there is any delay afterwards, we certainly are not to blame. The very same thing happens with respect to the *Bangor Register*, of which we sometimes do not receive a copy once in a Month. There must be some mismanagement in this which ought not assuredly to exist; but how to remedy the evil we cannot at present tell. We will however look to it on our part, and request the same favor from the Conductor of the *Bangor Register*.

What the editor has said about the *Gazette* itself, we deem too trivial to reply to.

We have prepared an article on the Boundary Question; but from its length, and our inability to curtail it without marring the intention of the whole, together with the prescribed limits of our present number, we are compelled to defer inserting it until next week.

We are also obliged to postpone our remarks upon the late proceedings of the House of Assembly.
