THE HARVEST IN SCOTLAND .- In Scotland the harvest, though (as will be seen by our Scotch agricultural report,) it did not become general in the earliest districts of that coustry till about the soth ultimo, is unusually forward ; and though the wheat is not in some parts, considered so great as that of ast year, which was, generally speaking abundant, the crops of corn are described as being satisfactory ; those of potatoes as promising to be exceedingly good.
