London papers have been received in Halifax to the 2nd of April, and Liverpool to the 4th, but we regret that the very circumscribed limits of our present number will only allow us to extract a few of the most material items.

It is expected that Mr. Canning will be promoted to the high situation of Premier.

On a question being asked by Mr. Hume in the House of Commons "whether the Correspondence with the American Government on the subject of its intercourse with our West India Colonies was to be considered final?"—Mr. Canning stated that he did so consider it, intimating at the same time that he had subscribed the last document on that question.

LONDON, March 19.

Bell's Messenger attributes the failure of the resolution in favour of Catholic Emancipation, in the House of Commons, to two causes—first, to the proceedings of the Catholic Association, and 2d, to the late conduct of the Priests in the County Elections, more particularly in the County of Waterford.

March 26th.

It now appears that there is a convention signed in January last, by which the Portuguese Government undertakes to provide garrisons, hospitals and forage for the British troops, whilst the British Government was only to incur the expences of embarking the army, and the ordinary current pay of the soldiers. A copy of it has been laid upon the table of the House of Lords, and Mr. Hume has moved for it in the Commons. We understand that the Portuguese Government have been unable to discharge this part of the Convention; that our troops are without forage and provisions, and are left almost wholly to the supply and support of our Government.

A final answer has been given by the Board of Trade to the application of the Ship-owners' Societies, who state in their memorial several plans by which the shipping interests, in their opinion, could be relieved. We believe, among the suggestions were, the reduction of the duty on timber from British North America, and a provision that all supplies for his Majesty's Dock yards should be brought by British ships;

a reduction of duty on sea-policy stamps, &c. &c. The answer from the Board is quite clear and decisive. The suggestions are peremptorily rejected.

LORD LIVERPOOL continues to go on very well.

The Catholics of Ireland seem resolved to have their question again brought under the consideration of Parliament in the present Session.

April 1st.

The military affairs of Portugal have proceeded most satisfactorily since our last.

Emigration is rapidly proceeding from this district.—Four vessels about to sail from the Clyde for British America and the United States, are already supplied with passengers. Several of the persons about to abandon their native home have long been in Glasgow, and were considered as the most efficient in their respective trades.—Glasgow Chronicle.

An article from Odessa, inserted in the Etoile, speaks with certainty as to the interference of Russia with the Porte in favour of the Greeks.
