THE ARMY.

GENERAL ORDER.

Horse Guards, Feb. 15, 1828.

The King has been graciously pleased to direct that General Lord Hill shall be placed on the Staff of His Majesty's Army, and that all matters respecting his Majesty's Military Service, which have heretofore been transacted by the Commander-in-Chief, shall henceforth pass through the hands of General Lord Hill, G. C. B.

The King's Service having imposed upon Field Marshall the Duke of Wellington, the necessity of resigning the office of Commander-in-chief, the Field Marshall is happy to deliver over the Command to a General Officer, who has so frequently promoted the honor of the Army by his own conduct and example; who is so well known to the Officers and troops, and so well acquainted with their services and merit.

LONDON, FEB. 19.

PORTSMOUTH, JAN. 17.—Lord Cochrane arrived on Monday in his schooner Unicorn in 28 days from Poros. He returns to this Country because the Greeks have no further need of his aid, the Turks not having a single vessel at sea. The Hellas, with the Corvettes, were laid up at Hydra; the smaller vessels of the Greek Navy are cruising for the suppression of piracy. His Lordship has expressed his willingness to return to Greece to assist in the suppression of piracy, by means of armed steam boats. The battle of Navarino has had a most desirable effect on the belligerents. His Lordship learned that the Egyptians were retiring from the contest in the Morea with as much celerity as the difficulty of procuring transports would permit. Soon after the battle, they commenced collecting all the vessels they could, and embarked in them 15,000 of their troops, and set sail for Alexandria, leaving about 800 in the fortified places, who are in the most desolate condition. It is estimated that about 12,000 have perished the past season by the sword, disease or famine.

The following article is written on the margin of the London Courier of the evening of February 18.

"It is currently reported, this evening, that accounts have been received from Odessa, stating that the Turks had massacred the whole of the Franks in Constantinople."

VIENNA, Feb. 5.

Merchantile letters, received here the day before yesterday from Odessa, say, that several persons attached to the Russian Legation at Constantinople, had arrived there, after a voyage of 5 days. Before their departure at Constantinople, a Firman of the Sultan had been issued, containing the following Resolutions:—

1st All ships under foreign flags are prohibited from entering or going out of the Dardanelles and the Bosphoros.

2d. All Franks, without distinction of nation, must place themselves under the class of Sajas, if they will not lose the protection of the Porte.

3d. All foreign property which is on board English, Russian, or French ships, shall be sequestered till further orders.

These measures, they say, were in consequence of the orders given by the Ambassadors at Vouris for the Consuls to take down their flags and arms, and to cease their functions by the 15th January.

Many executions are said to have taken place at Constantinople, and one of the most eminent Greek merchants of the name of Ralli, has been strangled.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 10.—The moderation which the Porte had observed, and which had given rise to a hope, that it had at heart the desire of pacification, has altogether vanished; or more, that it was a mask to conceal its true designs.

A Proclamation, addressed to all the Functionaries of the Empire, and conceived in terms indicating the greatest hatred of Christian Cabinets and all Christians, declares that it is a sacred duty to combat them, calls all Mussulmen to arms, says that it had had need of time to prepare for a bloody contest—and having gained this end, it would brave all dangers, and sooner fall than acknowledge the independence of the Greeks.

It was not contented with this proclamation, but proscribed more than 1500 subjects of the Allies, and caused them to dread a horrible fate if they remained. At this point the Charges des Affairs of neutrals interfered, by shewing that the Sultan's promise would be violated and treaties broken—that he would put all Europe in alarm—and that he would prepare a frightful catastrophe for himself. These representations appear to have made no impression. It is expected also that the Franks will be sent from all the other cities and provinces.

JAN. 11.

Government has delivered the detained grain to the bakers, and some among them have been executed for making light bread. Taxes are augmented, and Government prepares for a vigorous resistance. It has ordered risings in mass. They expect here, by the end of March, an army of 100,000 Kurdes. They think the vice Roy of Egypt will join his forces to those of the Grand Seignior. Constantinople never before exhibited such formidable preparations.

[P. S. PARIS, Feb. 20.—News has this day been received direct from Constantinople. It confirms the intelligence in the German papers of the hostile intentions of the Porte. The Sultan has published a Manifesto.]

And other Loaves in proportion. AND further Ordered, that each Baker do plainly mark the Initials of his Name on every Loaf of Bread, to be baked by him, together with the figures 3 6, or 12, (as the case may be,) to denote the price in pence, under a penalty of Ten Shillings for each and every offence.
