**FREDERICTON SUNDAY SCHOOL.**—We have much pleasure in noticing the Sunday School in this Town, under the patronage of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor and Lady Douglas, and the superintendance of the Rector of the Parish. The objects of this Institution are sufficiently obvious to supercede the necessity of any particular explanation, as none can question the advantages that must result from such an early initiation of the youthful mind, in the religious duties of society, and the important truths of revelation, as the peculiar capacity of each may admit of being successfully inculcated. The numbers of children in attendance since the erection of the new and commodious School House they now occupy, have, we are informed, increased, and continue to augment in various proportions; which certainly reflects great credit on the Parents and Guardians of such children, whose praise worthy example may (and we trust will) be imitated by others, as the School is not restricted either to any particular class or number.

Owing to the late severe illness with which His Excellency and Lady Douglas have been visited, (and from which her Ladyship is evidently yet far from being restored to health;) they were unable to pay their accustomed visits to the School at the usual seasons; nevertheless even in the depth of their extreme sufferings, all the deserving children received from them (through the Venerable Archdeacon) tokens of their remembrance as at other times; while the wants and necessities of the poorer classes were not forgotten in her Ladyship's customary benevolence towards them. Premiums were also awarded by His Excellency to those who had made the greatest progress, and bore the best character in their several classes. Nor was the coloured School which is held under the same roof, under the same patronage, and conducted in like manner, lost sight of in the beneficent regard of the esteemed persons alluded to. These Schools also receive material support from the visits of the Clergy, and the exertions of several Ladies and Gentlemen, who render very beneficial assistance in the furtherance of the good objects of the Institution—to complete the usefulness of which it seems to be only necessary to urge the importance of the regular and punctual attendance of the children; that "all things may be done decently and in order"—that the kind efforts of the Teachers may in no case, if possible, be in vain—and that the good results of the united endeavours of pupil and preceptor may become manifest "by their fruits."

"We are happy to understand that His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, has received instructions to proceed to Russia, for the purpose of being present at the discussions that may take place there in consequence of that power being appointed the Arbitrator in settling the Boundary Line question. From His Excellency's thorough knowledge of the Geographical situation of the different parts of the Province—from the information he possesses of its separate and combined interests, and from the exertions he has personally made in advancing them, both here and in the Parent State, we anticipate the happiest results—at all events, whichever way the contest may end, we feel confident the British Government could not have found, at this time, a more suitable person to be employed on this Embassy, than Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS."

The above is a very strong allusion to a circumstance, of which (while we have heard nothing as yet to justify it, on the score of the "instructions") the Province at large would undoubtedly reap the advantage, although it would as certainly feel the effects of His Excellency's absence. The other St. John papers also allude to the same matter; and if it be indeed true, as the Editor of the City Gazette appears to

believe, that His Excellency "is appointed Envoy to the Court of St. Petersburg," there can hardly be a doubt that it relates to the question of the Boundary Line; and we sincerely coincide with that Gentleman's remarks, that "the unwearied pains taken by His Excellency since his Administration of this Government to make himself master of the subject in question, eminently qualify him for that important duty."—To which is very justly added "his peculiar fitness for the work, and the intense interest he has always manifested in whatever concerns our welfare." We must confess that we ourselves, under the circumstances, are forcibly impressed with the reality of this appointment, altho' the Editors in St. John seem to have received the first intelligence; and as we think nothing would so opportunely conduce to the perfect reinstatement in health of the distinguished individuals who have suffered so long and painful an illness, as this at present imaginary voyage, we cordially wish the rumour may be found correct, and especially as it would so happily combine with it a subject of such paramount importance to the interests of this Province.

We had the pleasure of seeing Lady Douglas in Church on Sunday last, for the first time since her painful and protracted illness; but we were sorry to observe the evident change which has taken place in her Ladyship's previous healthful appearance.

**FATAL ACCIDENT.**—On Thursday morning last as Mr. JOHN LAWRENCE was crossing the River, with his Sled and horses, opposite Mr. Bedell's in Woodstock, the horses broke through the ice, when Mr. B. ran to Mr. L's assistance, and whilst the latter was endeavouring to untie the horses from the Sled, they gave a sudden plunge, and together with Mr. L., disappeared immediately under the ice, and by the great velocity of the current at that place, were borne instantly down the stream. At the same time Mr. Bedell's brother, who was also assisting, fell in, but was providentially saved. Mr. Lawrence has left a wife and child to lament his premature fate.

On Thursday last, about 2 o'clock, a fire broke out in the Dwelling House of Captain James Miles, in the Parish of St. Mary, which consumed about one third of the building; and but for the timely assistance of the Engines, and the exertions of those who hastened to the spot, every thing must have been absolutely destroyed in a short time. We are happy, however, to learn, that none of the goods were injured, and no further damage sustained than that we have noticed.

**HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, April 5.**

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House of Assembly.

The House attended in obedience to His Excellency's command, and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported that he had addressed His Excellency to the effect following.

"May it please your Excellency.

"The House of Assembly have made liberal provision for the public service of the current year; they now tender for your Excellency's acceptance the several Bills of appropriation passed during the present Session, and pray your Excellency's assent thereto. They feel confident that the Grants placed at your Excellency's disposal, will be so expended as to realize to the fullest extent, all the benefits which the House, in making them have anticipated."

And that His Excellency was then pleased to give his assent to the following Bills:

- "A Bill to continue and amend the Revenue Laws of the Province.
- "A Bill to apply a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the ordinary services of the Province.
- "A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned.
- "A Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province.
- "A Bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace of the City and County of St. John, to raise a sum of money for completing the Court-House in the said City and County.
- "A Bill to continue and amend the Act for the better securing of the Navigation of the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy.
- "A Bill relative to the Streets and Squares in the City of Saint John.
- "Bill to continue until the first day of April 1831, certain Acts, providing for the more effectually repairing the Streets and Bridges in the City and County of Saint John, and to amend the same.
- "A Bill to authorize the Justices of the County of Gloucester, to assess the said County for erecting a Court House and Gaol therein.
- "A Bill to authorize the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, to open a Street from the Wharf on the South side of the Market Slip, to the Wharf owned by Charles I. Peters, Esquire.
- "A Bill to regulate the manner of driving and riding upon the public Roads.
- "A Bill to continue an Act entitled "An Act to provide for the erection of Fences with Gates across the Highways, leading through Deer Island, in the Parish of West Isles and County of Charlotte."
- "A Bill to continue an Act until the first day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, intituled "An Act for the better regulation of licences to Inns, Taverns, and Houses for selling strong Liquors by retail."
- A Bill to alter the division line between the Parishes of Dundas and Wellington in the County of Kent.
- "A Bill for altering the times of holding the Inferior Courts of Common Pleas and Sessions in the County of Kent.
- "A Bill to continue and render more effectual certain Acts relative to Highways and Roads within this Province.
- A Bill to extend the provisions of an Act, intituled "an Act to repeal the Law now in force for appointing Fire Wardens, and the better extinguishing of Fires, so far as the same relate to the Town of Fredericton, and to make regulations more suitable to the said Town," to the Towns of Newcastle and Chatham, and their vicinities, in the County of Northumberland.
- "A Bill to further continue an Act intituled "An Act to provide for the erecting of Fences with Gates across Highways leading through Intervale Lands, in Queens County, and the County of Sunbury, where the same may be found necessary, and to extend the provisions of the same to Kings County."
- "A Bill to continue until the first day of April one thousand eight hundred and thirty, certain Acts for the support and relief of confined Debtors.
- "A Bill to erect a part of the Parish of Hillsborough in the County of Westmorland, into a distinct Town or Parish.
- "A Bill for altering the time of holding one of the terms of the Inferior Courts of Common Pleas, and General Sessions of the Peace, and also one of the additional terms of the said Inferior Court of Common Pleas for the County of Gloucester.
- "A Bill to grant a bounty on the destruction of Bears in this Province.
