

was at an end, and the ice too weak to be trusted. These facts show that experience has verified our former statements: and the reports of those who have lately been obliged to travel the Nerepis road, all concur in assuring us that when it shall have been completed, (a part of it is still in an unfinished state,) it will be found one of the most useful roads in the Province, and might vie with those in older countries, when the natural obstructions and difficulties which presented themselves, and the limited amount expended in the execution of the work, are taken into consideration.

We understand that the new Government House having been completed, has been delivered over by the Contractor to the Commissioners for superintending the erection of the building; and we learn that although it is at present in an unfurnished state, and will not be inhabited this winter, yet, arrangements are making for a full dress Ball to be given by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor on an extensive and splendid scale, on the last day of the year.

Being aware that much anxiety existed for the issue of the meeting of the House of Assembly of LOWER-CANADA, on the 21st inst.; it was with some inconvenience that we awaited the arrival of the last Canadian Mail till a late hour yesterday evening: The result, however, we are happy to say, has not disappointed our expectations: and it is with much satisfaction we lay before our readers, in this number, the official account of the meeting of the Provincial Parliament of LOWER-CANADA; and of the very gratifying circumstances connected therewith. Deeming every thing attending this subject, would, at the present moment, be acceptable to our readers in general; we have, in addition to the opening Speech of Sir JAMES KEMPT, also copied the Address of the Legislative Council in reply thereto; and which, with some short paragraphs in connexion, are all the proceedings of any particular interest that have yet reached us on this important subject. The "Special Communication from His Majesty" will no doubt be anxiously looked for.

From the latest papers received to this date, we submit a few extracts. Their contents, though brief, are not without some portion of interest. We have preferred making this sort of abstract for the present, as many of the statements we have seen, amongst some of the most recent advices, relating to the Seat of War, Catholic Emancipation, and the state of Ireland; those subjects now of paramount interest in the religious and political world; are not of so satisfactory a nature as might be desired: and a short time may put us in possession of an English Mail, from which it is not unlikely we shall derive, in some degree and in a more authentic shape, the wished-for information.

**LONDON, October. 27.**

We hear from an authentic quarter, that at the Privy Council held this day, it was resolved to convene Parliament early in November next, and that in order to that effect will appear in the "London Gazette" to-morrow evening.

We are sorry to learn by the accounts received this day from Gibraltar, that the fever is still making dreadful ravages in the garrison. On the 5th, 27 died; on the 4th, 23; and on the 3d, 24. In the last four days 99 deaths, and on the 13th October 13 officers were sick.—Weather rather wery.

The last accounts from Lisbon state, that a number of workmen are employed in demolishing the interior of the Chamber of Peers, as well as of the other Chambers, and it is positively asserted that large reinforcements of Spanish troops are daily arriving at the lines of Badajos.

Accounts from Vienna of the 15th October, state that on the 27th and 28th September, General Geismar and Gen. Roth had obtained fresh advantages over the Turks at Serbi Remanka, near Karankal, where they put to flight and dispersed the divisions under the command of the Pacha of Widia and Necropolis.

The foreign mails of this morning, from which we give extracts, are not important. It would appear however, from their contents, that the Russians are still in great force before Shumla and Varna.

**IRELAND.** Dublin had been thrown into a state of very great excitement by the arrest of Lawless, who had been taken into custody on a charge of sedition, by a warrant from Judge Burton. Mr. Lawless, accompanied by Mr. Shiel, Mr. Brady, Mr. Stanson, and others, attended the police officer to the Judge's Chambers, where he gave bail himself, in £500, and two sureties in a like sum, for his appearance at the next assizes for the county Monaghan, and was then released from Custody.

General Court mourning was ordered in England to begin on the 19th, on account of the death of the Queen Dowager of Wertemberg, sister of his Majesty, and Princess Royal of England.

A meeting took place in Kent, on the 24th October, at which 60,000 persons attended, and a brief Petition was read and adopted, by about two thirds of the assemblage. The following is the Petition alluded to:—

"To the Hon. the House of Commons of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in Parliament assembled,

"The humble petition of the undersigned freeholders of the County of Kent,

"Sheweth—That your petitioners beg leave to express to your honourable house, their deep sense of the blessings they enjoy under the protestant constitution of these kingdoms, which was settled at the revolution.

"Viewing with the deepest regret the proceedings which for a long time past have been carrying on in Ireland, your petitioners feel themselves imperatively called upon, to declare their strong and inviolable attachment to those Protestant principles, which have proved the best security for the civil and religious liberty of these Kingdoms. They, therefore, approach your hon. house, humbly but earnestly praying that the Protestant constitution of the United Kingdom, may be preserved entire and inviolate. And your petitioners will ever pray."

His Excellency Sir PEREGRINE MAITLAND, Lady Maitland, and family, arrived here on Friday morning last, in the Govt. brig Chebucto, Capt. Potter, from Boston; shortly after the brig came to anchor, his Excellency landed privately, and proceeded to Government House, and on Saturday, at half past three o'clock, went in state to the Council Chamber, where, in presence of His Honor the President, and His Majesty's Council, he took the usual oaths as Lieut. Governor of this Province.—*Halifax Journal, December 1.*
