My duty is very plain, and I beg you to be assured, that it shall be my constant study to act that while I firmly maintain the Prerogative of the Crown, I shall always, as faithfully, guard the Rights of the People."

ROBBERY AT HAMPTON. On Monday night, the Store of Mr. Samuel Hallett, at Hampton, was robbed of goods to the amount of £150. The perpetrators of this robbery, as in the case of Mr. Hathway's mentioned above, entered by cutting a panel out of the door of the store; and it was accomplished with so little noise, that although Mr. Hallett's and Mr. De Mill's families were both living in the premises, they knew nothing of what had taken place, till next morning. The thieves went to Mr. Crawford's stable, which was within a little distance, took a horse and sleigh, drove down to the vicinity of this town, and turned the horse with the sleigh loose. Yesterday morning, the horse and sleigh were found by Mr. Lumbard, standing in the road, opposite to his house in Portland. Some pieces of ribbon were found in the sleigh. It is supposed that the villains have crossed the harbour, and gone towards St. Andrews, and pursuit is made in that direction.— City Gazette, Jan. 30.

GAOL LIMITS.

At a Special Session of the Peace of our Lord the King, holden at the County Court House in Fredericton, in and for the County of York, on Friday the 1st day of February, 1828.

It is ORDERED, that in future, the Limits for the Gaol of the said County, under the Act of the General Assembly, 4th Geo. IV, Cap. 10, be as follows, that is to say:—

Commencing at the waters edge of the River St. John, where a continuation of the Southerly line of St. John Street would intersect the same, thence along the said line to Province Row, thence along the East

side of Province Row, to the side walk on the North side of Church Street, thence along the said side walk to Brunswick Street, thence along the Westerly side of Brunswick Street to St. John Street aforesaid, thence along the Southeasterly side of St. John Street to George Street, thence along the Westerly side of George Street, to where a continuation of the Northerly line of Carleton Street would intersect the same, thence along the said continuation line of Carleton Street aforesaid, through the Burying Ground to Brunswick Street aforesaid, thence along the Westerly side of Brunswick Street to where a continuation of the line between Lots Nos. 125 and 126, owned and occupied by B. S. Williams, and Lots No. 127 and 128, owned and occupied by William Bailey, would intersect the same, thence along the said line and a continuation thereof across King Street, and to the Easterly side of Queen Street, thence along the Easterly side of Queen Street to Carleton Street aforesaid, thence along the Northerly side of Carleton Street to the waters edge of the River St. John, and thence along the said waters edge to the place of beginning.
