The Hatti Scherif of the 20th Decem ber, which has been communicated here, in the Palace of the Porte, to all the assembled Ayans, and sent to all the Pachas, has pro duced the greatest consternation at Pera; because it is infered from it, that, hence forth, it will be impossible to remove the suspicion which the Divan has conceived against Russia.

The cause of the rigour with which the American Catholics have been treated, and that of their being sent from Galata and Pera, is now understood. By the articles of the Treaty of Peace, concluded lately between Russia and Persia, all the Armenian Catholics who might be in Persia, were to be placed for the future under the protection of Russia.
