NEW-BRUNSWICK AGRICULTURAL AND EMIGRANT SOCIETY.

At the last meeting of the New-Brunswick Agricultural and Emigrant Society, It was Resolved, that there be a Cattle Show on the 30th day of September next, at the Race Course, in Fredericton; and that premiums, as undermentioned, should be then awarded.

- For the best Provincial bred Stallion, 4 years old and upwards. £10 0 0
 - For the best Provincial bred Horse Colt, from one to 4 years old, 8 0 0
 - For the best pair of Provincial bred Draught Mares or Geldings, not less than 4, nor more than 10 years old, owned by one person, 10 0 0
 - For the best Provincial bred Bull, not less than two years old, 5 0 0
 - For the second best ditto ditto ditto, 3 0 0
 - For the best Bull Calf, from 5 to 12 months old, 2 10 0
 - For the best Provincial bred Cow, not less than 3 years old, 3 0 0
 - For the second best ditto ditto ditto ditto, 2 0 0
 - For the best Provincial bred Heifer from two to three years old, 2 0 0
 - For the best Ram, not being one of those imported by the Society, 5 0 0
 - For the best Ewe, ditto ditto ditto ditto, 2 10 0
 - For the best Boar, do. do. do. do. 2 0 0
 - For the best Sow, do. do. do. do. 1 10 0
 - For the best Provincial bred fat Ox, not less than 4 years old, 5 0 0
 - For the best Provincial bred pair of working Oxen, not less than 4 years old, owned by one person, 5 0 0
 - For the second best, do. do. do. do. 2 10 0
- And it was further Resolved, that Premiums, as follow, be granted, viz.
- For the greatest quantity of good Butter produced from any one Dairy in this Province between the first day of May and the 10th day of November in the present year, 10 0 0
 - For the second greatest do. do. do. do. 5 0 0
 - For the greatest quantity of Butter, in proportion to the number (not less than four) of the Cows, from which it may be made, 5 0 0
- And it was further Resolved, that there be awarded to the person who shall bring to Fredericton Market, during the present year, not less than

twenty Hogsheads of Lime, manufactured from stone that may be found on the River St. John, or its branches, above Fredericton, a premium of 10 0 0 The four last mentioned premiums, to be awarded at the next Annual Meeting of the Society.

RULES OF COMPETITION.

- I. The decision of the Judges appointed to award the Prizes, to be final.
- II. The owner of any Animal for which a premium shall be claimed, must give information in writing to the Secretary, what breed the Animal is of, and where bred.
- III. To entitle any claimant to the premium for the best, or the second best fat Ox, it is further required, that he not only exhibit a statement of the mode of fattening, but prove that the Animal has been kept within this Province for at least twelve months prior to the day of exhibition.
- IV. Claimants for premiums for the best, and second best working Oxen, must prove that each pair has been worked together at least six months before the day of exhibition.
- V. The quantity and quality of the Butter, for which premiums may be claimed, and the number of Cows from which the same shall have been made, together with the mode of feeding the Cows, to be proved by the Affidavit of the Claimant, confirmed by two respectable neighbours.
- VI. Persons claiming premiums upon imported Animals, shall engage to keep the same within the Province.
- VII. No Animal for which one premium shall have been awarded to any owner, shall be considered a subject for any further premium of the Society, except it be for qualities different from those for which the first premium was awarded. No premiums will be awarded to any person who shall not be a Member of the Central Society, or of some one of the County Agricultural Societies, in this Province.

Any attempts to obtain premiums by unfair practices, will be punished by a forfeiture of the premium, should it be awarded before a discovery, and will also preclude the offender from competing for premiums in future. Premiums not demanded within six months after they are awarded, shall be considered as having been generously given in aid of the funds of the Society.

Ireland.

It gives us great pleasure to be able to state that the Marquis of Anglesea is in the enjoyment of considerably improved spirits, since his Excellency's arrival in Ireland. On Tuesday his Excellency, accompanied by the Earl of Uxbridge and the Ladies Paget, proceeded on foot from the Castle, and walked through Dame street, College-green, Westmoreland-street, and Sackville-street, and returned by the Quays and Parliament-street to the Castle. Crowds of persons, of both sexes, and of all grades seemed anxious to catch a glimpse of the Lord Lieutenant, and of his amiable daughters, and evinced their joy at seeing the new Viceroy mingling with the crowd, and unattended by any guards, unless the affection and esteem of a generous and faithful but, unfortunately, too long misgoverned people.—*Dublin Freeman's Journal*

The Venus steam-packet left Waterford on Tuesday for Dublin. When she was about mid-way off the coast between Gorgey and Arklow, in a heavy gale of wind, part of the machinery broke, and a large bolt was struck against her bottom with such force that it passed through. She immediately began to fill; for some time all hands were at the pumps to keep down the water, but when it got dark, the captain, mate, steward, and some of the sailors got into the boat, and left four of the sailors with all the passengers to their fate. Previous to the captain's quitting the vessel she was but a mile from the shore, in five or six fathoms water, and had he called the sailors to drop the anchor, all would have been safe; but the wind and tide carried her out about two miles before the passengers thought of dropping it. They then endeavoured to do so, but it became entangled in the chains, and before they were able to free the anchor, it was too late to make use of it. The vessel filled fast, and in about an hour from the time the captain left her, she
