As all emonstrance, and attempt to elude his fury were ain, Cochran ran to a neighbour's, (Mr. Brad-(,) who happened to be from home, and got a gun om a boy who was there, and came with it to his wn premises. When Rogers saw him coming, he an violently upon him, and the other, who appeared be intent only upon preserving his wife and himelf from insult and abuse, charged him upon his eril to stand off and desist. But Rogers, regardss of all consequences, continued to press upon im, and when Cochran saw no way of escape from e fury of Rogers, he presented the gun, and disharged the contents, (a slug,) which took effect, and wounded him in the part first mentioned. HE Subscriber feels it his duty to publish the following RESOLUTIONS of the House of Assembly, passed in the year 1826, and requests that the Commissioners of Bye-Roads and Bridges within the Province, will be guided by a strict observance of the same in the returns made by them, of their respective accounts; and that they may be forwarded to him, at his office, in St John, as early as circumstances will admit, and not later than the 1st day of October next :

WHEREAS it appears to this House, that the Accounts rendered by Commissioners of Monies expended on the Bye-Roads and Bridges, are frequently not sufficiently particular and explicit; but that this in general proceeds from ignorance of what is required, and not from wilful neglect or default : Thereupon Resolved, that it is the opinion of this House, that, " The Commissioners of Bye-Rosds and Bridges, in making up their accounts of Monies expended, should state in such accounts.

1st - " Whether any, and what parts have been done by Con tract; and if so, the names of the contractors, the nature of the Contract, whether so much per Rod, or other distance; or so much for the whole; or in what other way; how the contract has been performed, and what sums have actually been paid.

2d,-" If done by days work, to state the names of the workmen; the rate of wages per day, of each man; whether found in provisions or not; the number of days which each man has worked; the amount paid each man; the quality of work done; and the mode in which the same has been performed.

3d -" The proper receipts should accompany the Accounts of all Monies paid by the Commissioner; and if the same are signed with a mark, they must be witnessed by at least one respectable witness.

4th. - The Commissioners accounts should be attested to, before a Justice of the Peace; and the nath to be in the following form or to that effect :

We, A. B. & C. D. the Commissioners within named, " do make outh that the foregoing account is correct and true, and "that the several sums therein mentioned as paid, have actually been paid by us, as therein stated,

(Signed) Sworn the Justice of Peace.

The Commissioners are also hereby required to head their several accounts in the following manner, to wit :-
