**The Earl of Winchelsea.**—The withdrawal of this Nobleman's name from the list of subscribers to the King's College, was the cause of his rencontre with the Duke of Wellington, and the latter event has since caused the Noble Earl to withdraw his name from the British Society for promoting the religious principles of the Reformation. Within a few days the Earl has addressed a letter to the Secretary of the Society, requesting that he may no longer be considered one of its Vice-Presidents; assigning as a reason, that after the violation of the laws of God and man, of which he felt he has been guilty in a recent affair, his name was unfit to appear at the head of a religious institution. — *Manch. Ad.*

**King's College.**—A meeting of the subscribers and donors to this institution was held on the 16th May; his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury presiding. The report of the provisional committee set forth that a sum of £126,974 3s. 6d. had been obtained in donations and subscriptions towards effecting the undertaking; that an advantageous site had been procured by a grant from His Majesty's government of a piece of ground on the eastern side of Somerset-house; that measures had been taken to proceed with the structure on this site, in conformity with certain conditions made in the grant, and after a plan appropriate to the purposes of the building; that a royal charter had been obtained; finally, that an estimate had been made of the cost of the undertaking, which amounted to £170,000, for the excess of which, above the sum obtained, the committee look with confidence to the public, saying, in concluding their report,—"They are firmly persuaded that the friends of a sound education, on the principals of the Church of England, will continue their most zealous exertions in promoting a work which will secure to the rising generation, in this metropolis and its vicinity, the benefits of an economical, a scientific, and a religious course of instruction."

**BERMUDA, June 23.**

On Wednesday morning last these Islands were visited by a severe storm of wind and rain, accompanied by tremendous flashes of forked lightning, seldom equalled here: about half past seven o'clock the storm increased to an appalling degree of alarm; its duration was happily short, but we are concerned to state that its effects proved fatal to Mr. Frederick A. Robinson. The house in which this unfortunate young man resided, situate in Devonshire parish, near the Dock, was struck with lightning, the electric fluid went down the chimney, through a room in which the mother and sisters of the deceased were, and into a passage adjoining where Mr. R., whom it struck, was, and instantly deprived him of life. The chimney was much shattered, and some trifling damage done in the room. Mr. R. was quite a young man, and his death is a source of deep regret to his numerous relatives and friends.

During the storm the Merchant Ship Speke, Morris, master, lying in the harbour of St. George, about 400 yards from the Town and about the Town, and the same distance from the Ordnance Powder Magazine, forming an angle, was struck by lightning; the electric fluid caught the main-top mast-head, split it to pieces, passed down and entered one of the pumps, ripped up its chamber, and then exploded on deck; several of her crew with the pilot were severely hurt, but we are happy to say not dangerously.

Speaking of the Powder Magazine, we apprehend the inhabitants of St. George, who at the time turned their thoughts to that object, must have been seriously alarmed for their fate, and particularly those who were living in that Town a few years since, when the one on the same spot exploded, and caused so much damage to the Town. The quantity of Powder then in it was comparatively small; the present building, we understand, is constructed of wood, and secured with iron!!!
