On Thursday His Majesty held a Drawing Room, which drew around him a most extensive Assembly of all descriptions of Rank and Fashion—And it was gratifying to find His Majesty's health so improved, as to enable him with much comfort and ease to go through so lengthly a ceremony.

We understand that the health of His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence is improving.

At the Levee on Wednesday His Majesty conferred the honour of knighthood upon Captains Parry and Franklin, the celebrated navigators; and also upon W. Seymour, Esquire, recently appointed to the Chief Justiceship of Bombay, and W. A. Scarlett, Esq., Chief Justice of Jamaica.

EXTRAORDINARY TROTTING MATCH.—The long talked of trotting match between Rattler, the American horse, and Miss Turner, the Welsh mare (for 400 sovereigns,) was decided on Saturday, over ten miles of ground, between Cambridge and Godmanchester, commencing at the second mile-stone from Cambridge. It was stipulated that the mare should have a minute's start, which, upon calculation, was estimated at about six hundred yards in distance. Rattler was ridden by Wm. Haggerty, the American groom, dressed in a light flannel jacket, blue silk cap, olive green velvet trousers, and boots without spurs, and a small whip in his hand; his stirrups were wrapped round with list to prevent his feet from slipping: he rode with a common snaffle bit. The mare was ridden by little Davy, in a jockey silk cap and jacket, boots and spurs. According to the terms of the match the American groom was to weigh 10 stone, while the mare was not confined to weight, and Davy, saddle and all, did not weigh more than seven stone. Shortly after 12, all being in readiness, the road was cleared, and at a given signal, the mare was started at a pace of at least twenty miles an hour. A clear minute having elapsed, Rattler, who, all activity and impatience, as if perfectly conscious of the struggle he was about to be engaged in, was then let go, and almost instantaneously laid himself down to his work with extraordinary speed. It was soon seen that he was gaining on the mare, and he was urged to improve his advantage. At the close of the tenth mile, the horse was full sixty yards in front, having completed the distance in 30 minutes and 40 seconds! a feat unparalleled in the history of horse-flesh in this country. The time of the mare was 31 minutes 42 seconds; and making allowances for breaking and turning, the credit due her is scarcely inferior to that given to the horse. There was some talk of a fresh match, for a longer distance, but this was met by the owner of Rattler, offering to back him against any thing living, for any distance, in or out of harness, for any sum from 200*l.* to 5000*l.*

In the Royal Almanack of France, Donna Maria's name is inserted as Queen of Portugal.

Jussuf Pacha, who commanded the garrison of Varna during the Russian siege, died at Odessa in the beginning of March. He had several times in vain solicited permission to go to Italy or Switzerland.

Cholera Morbus.—The East India Company's Ship Abercrombie Robinson, Captain John Innes, left Bombay on the 10th August: that evening a boy was taken ill, and died. On the 12th the sickness was general, and raged so violently, that in the space of five days, of thirty-eight who were attacked, twenty-four died; six of them in less than six hours, and thirteen in less than twelve hours from the first attack. Nine were buried in one day. The disease appeared without exception, under the extreme and dangerous form of collapse. The sufferers who were among the best men in the ship, were taken suddenly ill while at work, though previously in good health. One of them, while the funeral service was reading, felt a sudden shock, and made an exclamation of alarm, was taken below sick, and ere morning was a corpse. No remedy or palliative for this epidemic could be discovered. The vital energy seemed so completely destroyed, from the first moment of ostensible disease, as to leave an insufficiency of life remaining to be influenced by restorative means.

The late Assassination at Paris.—Paris, May 4.—The unfortunate M. Calermard Lafayette, the victim of the horrible assassination in our paper of yesterday, lingered until half-past four on Sunday morning when he expired, after having endured the most severe agonies for several hours.—*French Paper.*

Russian Canals.—A junction of the Volga and

the Moskva is about to be effected by means of a canal, which will unite the rivers Sestra and Istra; the first of which communicates by the Doubna with the Volga, and the second of which runs into the Moskva. The original idea of this junction was conceived by Peter I. The first stone of the first lock of the canal was laid in October, 1827. The expense of the undertaking is estimated at 5,340,000 rubles. A plan is also under consideration for forming a junction between the Volga and the western Lyma.
