

European Intelligence.

FRANCE.

House-rent and house-room have been for some time at a premium in Paris. Hundreds, some say thousands, have been driven beyond the barriers unable to pay the rents demanded.

The Countess de Chambord, it is said, is likely to become the mother to a "legitimate" heir to the throne of France.

It is impossible to look with satisfaction on the state of France; not only is the health of the Emperor becoming a subject of greater apprehension, but, if he live and retain his vigour, all is not quite smooth for him.

The reports of the sinking health of the Emperor—the confused aspect of the state of the foreign relations of France—the general rise in the price of all necessaries of life, chiefly in Paris itself, where the effects of the heavy duties add to every other burden, the critical state of the money market, a result of the last war, and of the unhealthy character of enterprise all over the Continent—all these co-operate to make every symptom of popular discontent more important than it would have been a year ago.

TURKEY.

The Sultan has accepted the decorations of various Orders from England, Prussia, and Portugal, and has sent a splendid diamond necklace to the Empress of Austria.

NAPLES.

There never was perhaps a recess with less of political excitement, especially with so many more foreign complications hanging over our heads. There is the Neapolitan intervention, which though unaccountably delayed is still persisted in, and which threatens to bring all the fleets of Europe into the Bay of Naples.

FINANCIAL MATTERS.

There is every indication of a money panic, confined not to England, but extending all over Europe. Its symptoms are more alarming in France than here, though the French papers, speaking, I have no doubt, according to Government order, say that the financial affairs were all proceeding without check or cause for alarm, when the distrust in England extended itself to them and caused the prices of their funds to fall.

BELGIUM.

The Belgian Government is at present engaged in a series of scientific inquiries, with a

view to a vigorous prosecution of the deep-sea fishery on the east coast of Scotland. Beyond certain limits, foreigners are permitted to fish on the British coasts, and Belgium is determined to take advantage of the tracks by which the herrings reach the Scotch shores in order to deposit their spawn.

SWITZERLAND.

The National Council of Switzerland, on the 27th ult., passed a vote unanimously that the Republicans of Neuchâtel had deserved well of their country, and that the Federal Government ought to persist in the conduct which it has hitherto followed.

The Grand Council of Neuchâtel has voted, by a majority of forty-eight to thirty-one, the dissolution of the bourgeoisie, the creation of a municipality, the expulsion of the compromised clergy, and the dismissal of officials who had secretly or openly aided the late insurrection.

NEW ZEALAND.

Advices from Nelson, New Zealand, dated the 20th of May, confirm the report of gold discoveries in the neighbourhood of that settlement. They are at a distance of about twenty miles and a considerable number of persons were flocking to them.
