Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly

Our especial gratitude, as a people, is due to the Almighty for our exemption from Pestilence during the year that has past.

To that source we must also gratefully ascribe the success which, in the last season, has attended the industry of the Husbandman, and rewarded the toils of the Fisherman.

The Revenue, though somewhat diminished in productiveness, when compared with that of the preceding year, as was anticipated, from the reduction of Duties, and the first effects of suddenly expanded Commercial freedom, is nevertheless, amply sufficient to meet all demands upon it, and affords satisfactory evidence of the increased energies, and growing prosperity, of the people.

The Normal School—opened at Truro during the past Autumn, under circumstances most auspicious—is now in efficient operation.

A measure, having for its subject the improvement of the general educational condition of the Country, will be submitted for your consideration.

Our Railway system is progressing favourably, and I trust that, when the Accounts of the expenditure, and liabilities, connected with it, are laid before you, the utmost prudence and economy will be found to have been observed by those to whom the Legislature has entrusted the conduct of this important branch of the public service.

The Reports and Accounts respecting St. Peter's Canal, and the Lunatic Asylum, when submitted to you, will show that those public works have advanced satisfactorily during the past season.

On the subject of the Mines and Minerals, in connexion with the claims of the General Mining Association, an opinion of the Imperial Law Officers of the Crown, and a Correspondence with the Colonial Secretary, will be laid before you, which will doubtless engage your most earnest attention.

A measure will be submitted to you, founded on the example of the Mother Country, and on our local experience, for facilitating the collection, and improving the administration, of the Revenue.

The substitution of a simpler and more economical process for vesting forfeited lands in the Crown, in place of the existing system, will be proposed to you by my Government.

The selections of Stock which I have made, in accordance with the desire, expressed in the closing Session of the last Parliament, will, I trust, commend themselves to your approval.

I venture to indulge a confident expectation that the further promotion of Agriculture, in its various relations, will, in the present Session, command the interest of the Representatives of a people thoroughly capable of appreciating the importance of that great object.

Some modification of the existing Laws for protection of the River Fisheries appears to me imperatively called for, and I trust that your local experience will suggest such improvement of them as will ensure the attainment of the purpose for which they were enacted.

You will be gratified, I am sure, to learn that I have resumed the occupation of Government House, seriously injured by the late fire, but renovated and refurnished in a style that bespeaks your munificence, whilst it demands my grateful acknowledgements.

Stewart Campbell, Esq., the Speaker of the Former House, was elected Speaker without opposition, and the usual Officers of the House chosen, Alexander James, Esq., the former Assistant Clerk, being appointed Chief Clerk, and James G. Tobin, Esq., Assistant Clerk, the Rev. Dr. Twining was re-elected Chaplain of the House.

It is surely a just matter of gratitude to God that amid the wars and tumults that are desolating or impoverishing so large a portion of the old world, these peaceful Provinces are exempted from all the worst evils which are the inevitable consequence of war, and that we are permitted to see our country flourishing in the arts of peace and industry.

We shall, as we have already said, endeavour to furnish our readers with as full reports as possible of all matters of general or local interest, which we think it will be important for them to know.

The House was occupied on Monday in appointing the usual standing committees.

Petitions were presented against the return of J. H. Fuller, Esq., for the County of Richmond, and H. Martell, Esq., for the Township of Arichat, to be taken into consideration on Saturday next.

General Intelligence.

THE BAZAAR on behalf of the Halifax Mechanics Library, on the 14th inst., promises to be a successful effort, as we bear a large number of ladies are making preparations.

THE Grand Jury for the County of Halifax, in their presentment, suggest that the County Jail should be incorporated with the proposed County Court House, they also recommend that the bread for the prisoners, instead of being as at present made of superfine flour should be made of a mixture of flour and cornmeal.

The Order of Observing Lent.

In the Archdiocese of Halifax, for 1856.

Every Week Day in Lent is a Fast Day on one Meat and a Collation. By virtue of powers delegated to him by the Holy See, the Archbishop permits the use of Flesh Meat at breakfast and dinner on Sundays; and at dinner only on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays during Lent.

It is strictly prohibited to use Fish and Flesh Meat at the same repast; and Eggs are forbidden on Ash Wednesday, Spy Wednesday and Good Friday.

The presentation of a Testimonial from a large number of the Citizens of Halifax, to ex Mayor, Henry Pryor, Esq., took place at Mason's Hall, on Wednesday evening last. It consisted of three pieces of silver plate—an epergne and two claret jugs, all of very handsome pattern. Each of the pieces bore Mr. Pryor's coat of arms, and the following inscription:—

THE BRIGANTINE BELLE.—The owner and seaman of the Merlin having instituted a suit in the Vice Admiralty Court of Halifax for salvage, his Worship James Stewart, the Acting Judge of the Court, on Monday decreed,—That after deducting the expenses reported by the Registrar to have been incurred by the owners of the Merlin for repairs, new shaft, &c., the sum of £650, as salvage in the case, to be apportioned thus:—£325 to the owner of the Merlin, £60 to the captain, £27 to the chief-mate, £23 to the second mate, (who had received some injury,) £100 between the eight seamen, and £115 to be rateably divided among the rest of the crew, according to their several rates of wages.

Disasters.

SHEET HARBOUR, January 25.—The schr Chieftain, Alexander Fraser, master, arrived here on the 19th inst. from Carbonar, Nfld., bound to Halifax, 30 days out, occasioned by head winds; two men sick from being chilled by the frost. The vessel was disabled in the gale of the 27th and 28th ult.; obliged to throw part of her cargo overboard. The Chieftain is frozen in here. Spoke a schooner on the 13th Dec., bound for Odena, Nfld., with her foresail gone; could not ascertain her name.

The Acadia, Potter, of Digby, N. S., from Glasgow for New York, had put back to Cork, 2nd ult., having been struck by a sea, lat 44 N, long 32 W.; became leaky, bulwarks carried away, head rails and boards gone, bowsprit loose, boats stove, lost studding sails with yards from off deck, men's hoes all stove to pieces, wheel broken, and stem stove in. The crew kept constantly at the pumps since the date of disaster, vessel making from ten to twelve inches of water per hour, which rendered it necessary for the safety of ship and cargo to put into the nearest port, and arrived in Cork harbor, 31st ult.

Capt. Lot, of the steamer Asia, hence at Liverpool, reports, on the 6th ult., in lat 46, lon 51, boarded the schr Sarah, Griffin, of Halifax, dismasted, and in a sinking state, and took off the crew, consisting of Capt. and five men.

The Steamship Ericsson, at New York, from Havre, reports, lat 43 30, lon 59 20, spoke brig Sabina, of Yarmouth, N. S., from Palermo for Boston, out 78 days; had experienced very heavy weather, sprung mainmast, main yard, and jibboom gone, and suffered severely in sails; had four men disabled.—Supplied her with provisions, twine and needles, and remained close to these until the boat returned to the brig.
