which we give the following syngsis :1st, Section declares the object of the Bill to 2nd. "Stops Act.
Act on payment of costs already incerre the said 3rd. . Provides for the return of all. Liquo
seived under the said Act and not destroyed,

4th, "Provides for the levying and collecting
of duties as if the said Act had never been pass-
ed. 5 th. " Gives the Sessions power to make compensation to Agents and to dispose of liquors in their possession.
thth. "Declares the former licence Law in full force.
7 th. "Directs that a special sessions may grant licences till the next Coatery Sessions.
8th. Gives directions concerning the punish ment of infractions of the License Law,

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly "I thank you for the attention which you have iven to the public business.
The measure which you bave passed and to which I have readily given my assent for the re-
peal of the Act Prohibiting the Importation and Manufacture of and Traffic in Intoxicatin fiquors, will have a material-effect in improvig he financial condition of the Province; and inmately acquainted as you are with the feelings

Act to change the Corstitution of the LegislaAct to change the Constitution of the Legisla-
tive Council, by rendering the same elective, reserved for Her Majesty's pleasure, is declared o have received that Royal Assent, on the 24th
day of June last, and has thus become the law of the land. The Act provides that the Legislative Council shall consist of the present Menbers, and of 48 additional to be elected from the same number of electoral distriets in Upper and
Lower Canada, equally, Councillers to be 39 years of age, British subjects, and possessed of yeal estate to the value of $£ 2000$, clear of al debts and ineumbrances, situated within the electoral district for which they are returned No member of the Assembly can be elected to the Council. Seat to be vacated for becoming or ceasing to hold the property qualification Term of election, eight yroers, The Electoral
Districts are divided into twelve groups of four Distric
each.
