NEW LIGHT HOUSE .- The British Government have recently caused to be erected a new Light House on Cape River, Newfoundland, which will be lighted for the first time, on the 15th December next, from sunset to sunrise. The light, which is a fixed white one, is elevated 180 feet above mean water level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather 17 miles from a ship's deck. The tower is striped red and white vertically. A toll will be levied upon all vessels benefiting by this Light.
