Shaw (Sheriff) against McNutt. Action on Jail Limit Bond. Owen and Grantham for Plaintiff; Creighton and Murray for Defendant. The Judge was in favor of Plaintiff, but as the Defendant demanded a jury, it was granted, and the cause was continued.

Second Day.—Goudey against Wood. Owen for Plaintiff; Creighton and Murray for Defendant. Plea withdrawn. Judgment for Plaintiff in ejectment for No. 2 of lots on Tuskiet River.

Heirs of Reynard against Charles Andrews and wife. Owen for Plaintiff; Creighton and Grantham for Defendants. Ejectment for Lot No. 80, near Tuskiet Lakes. Surveyors and other witnesses examined, and pleas produced. Not decided until the following day. Verdicts for Plaintiffs.

Criminals tried.—Our Court business has hitherto been managed, here, with much decorum and quiet.

The recent importation by the Agricultural Society, of our improved breed of sheep, is likely to be very beneficial. Let the parties to whom they may be handed over, faithfully perform their trust.

**New Light House.**—The British Government have recently caused to be erected a new Light House on Cape River, Newfoundland, which will be lighted for the first time, on the 15th December next, from sunset to sunrise. The light, which is a fixed white one, is elevated 180 feet above mean water level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather 17 miles from a ship's deck. The tower is striped red and white vertically. A toll will be levied upon all vessels benefiting by this Light.

**New Brunswick.**

We have received No. 5 of *The Borderer*, a weekly paper published at Sackville, N. B. It indicates a spirit of enterprise and progress, and will doubtless be a great convenience to business men in the counties which unite the two provinces. We copy the following item of news from its columns:—

The Exhibition of Stock, Grain, and Roots by the Sackville and Westmoreland Agricultural Society, took place on Monday 20th inst.

The day was fine, and a very large number of persons were present. The show of Stock exceeded that of last year, the vegetables very fine.

On Saturday the 1st inst., Mr. Tucker, Lloyd's agent, was driving out, at St. John accompanied by Mr. Howard Primrose, of Pictou, Nova Scotia, when the carriage was upset, by the wheel passing over a stone. Mr. Tucker had some ribs broken and was otherwise seriously injured. Mr. Primrose besides being considerably bruised, had one of his legs broken.

**PROGRESS OF THE RAILWAY AT SHEDIAC.**

Last Tuesday evening, the locomotive at the Shediac end of the railway passed over the temporary bridge at the Scadouc river for the first time, and took down thirty-six cars loaded with firewood to the harbour of Shediac. On Wednesday the ballasting of the line commenced with gravel of excellent quality for the purpose, procured from a hill near the mouth of the Scadouc.—We are happy to state, that the rails are now laid five miles out of Shediac, and as the locomotive is fairly at work, that portion of the railway will be finished very shortly, by which time it is expected that four miles more will be ready for ballasting.

**Canada.**

A terrific hurricane swept over the Canadian Lakes and along the St. Lawrence, on the night of the 5th inst., causing a great destruction to shipping and much damage to property on land.

The *Quebec Chronicle* of the 25th instant, says:—"We are informed that a block of copper ore, of about 700 weight, and carrying about 70 per cent of metal, has recently been brought to town from the Harvey Hill Mines, in Leeds, Megantic.

**A CUNARD LINE TO CANADA.**—The *Quebec Colonist* mentions a rumour that Captain Lang, of the Cunard steamer Canada, has been in that city to make arrangements for the purchase of property, to build a wharf for the line of steamers to be sent there by the Cunard Company next year.

The Montreal ocean steamers will, during the winter season, run between Portland and Liverpool, beginning on the 25th November, from Liverpool.
