The Sultan has decreed that in remembrance of the courage and perseverance displayed by the inhabitants of Silistria, in 1854, they shall not be liable, for three years, to any taxes, nor to furnish recruits to the army.

A man confined in the prison at Basle in Switzerland, made his escape a few days ago by putting on the hat and cloak which the chaplain of the establishment had left in one of the corridors.

There is talk at Rome of removing Cardinal Wiseman to a position wherein he can indulge in congenial literary leisure; and of the elevation of Dr. Cullen to the cardinalate.

At the grand naval review by her Majesty the Queen, which is to take place at Spithead on the 16th and 17th of the present month, there will be at least 300 war steamers, including line-of-battle ships, frigates, corvettes, gunboats, mortar vessels, and floating batteries, all of which will be fully armed and manned.

A RUSSIAN COMMERCIAL STEAM FLEET.—It is said that the Russians intend to build a large fleet of commercial steamers at Nicolaieff.

THE WORLDS SHIPPING.—The German Quarterly Magazine has an article on the world's marine, from which it appears that the waters of the earth are navigated by 140,000 vessels, of 12,904,687 tons.

THE SUEZ CANAL.—M. de Lesseps, the projector of this undertaking, has returned to Paris. Forty-five million francs were subscribed for the project in Egypt, and in Austria he disposed of twenty-five million shares.

FACTS ABOUT CHINA.—The area of China is about 5,500,000 square miles, or eleven times and a half larger than Great Britain and Ireland.

"The population is nearly 400,000,000, of which about 83,000 die daily. The people are generally idolaters.

"The government is pure despotism. Officials are mostly corrupt; and, with rare exceptions, practise great tyranny in their several departments.

"By the treaty with Great Britain in 1842, the Emperor of China ceded the island of Hong Kong to England, and threw open the ports of Canton, Fuh-chau, Amoy, Ningpo, and Shanghai, to the British and other nations.

"The first Protestant missionary to China was Robert Morrison, of the London Missionary Society. He arrived in 1807, and died in 1834.

On Maundy Thursday the Emperor of Austria performed an ancient ceremony in the chapel of the Imperial palace: he served at table twelve of the oldest poor citizens, and then poured water over and wiped their feet.

The British ship of war, Powerful, arrived at Havana on the 10th of March, with orders to unite there all the English and French naval forces in the Mexican Gulf, and to start immediately for Nicaragua.

Vesuvius is again unusually active, and promises an approaching eruption. Not merely smoke, but stones and flames are thrown out, and those who have been up the mountain speak of hearing subterranean sounds.

The Rockport Register relates that a child in that place had to all appearances, died, and was laid out in its little winding-sheet upon a board in an upper room. Some time after, the father went into the room where the child was, and was astonished at its calling him by name, and complaining that it did not lie good.

DEAD LETTERS.—The Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun, under date of March 26, says: The foreign dead letter mails, composed of correspondence from distant countries, and not applied for by persons to whom addressed, were to-day made up in due form at the General Post Office, and returned as follows: To England, 26,000 letters; Bremen, 4000; Cologne, 48,000; Nova Scotia, 500; New Brunswick, 440; and 7500 to Canada.

The whole number of cars and locomotives on the Erie Railroad is 3168, which, is coupled together in one train, would reach a distance of twenty-one miles, and be able to carry 150,000 persons in one day from New York to Lake Erie.
