Fairbanks, have directed Mr Alexander Farquharson to take charge of the machine and work it during the present season, when its services may be required, in the vicinity of Dartmouth and Halifax, at the rate of 5s. per acre.

REV. E. F. FOSHAY, late of N. B., has accepted a call from the Baptist Church of Pugwash—and has entered upon his duties in that interesting locality.

A TEA MEETING was held on the 23rd inst. in the new Baptist meeting house in Little Forks. The day was favorable, and the attendance unusually large for a place where the people are so scattered.

TEMPERANCE LECTURE.—Dr Clay delivered an admirable lecture on Temperance at Westmorland, N. B., on the evening of the 23rd inst., to an audience of about five hundred. He was to lecture at Moncton on the following evening.

SEIZURE UNDER THE LIQUOR LAW.—We are informed that a schooner having on board ten barrels of Rum has been seized by the Officers of Customs and is detained at the Custom House Slip.

RAILROAD DISASTER.—A frightful collision occurred on the Railroad between Philadelphia and Columbia.

It is estimated that there were over 1100 persons on the train, of which more than half were small children, belonging to the Roman Catholic Sunday School, who were being conveyed with their teachers and parents to spend the day in the enjoyment of a picnic.

The crash of the two trains was distinctively heard at the hotel at Fort Washington, and for a distance of over a mile out at Dewey's Lane.

All the physicians in the neighbouring towns were summoned to the place, and used their best efforts to relieve the wounded.

The most horrible sight of all was that of the burning cars, for in a few moments after the collision, the fire spread rapidly through the broken remnants, burning and roasting to death nineteen men, women and children.

The place where the accident occurred is called Camp Hill Station, 14 miles from Philadelphia. The road curves twice, so that at, say 500 yards off; the locomotive could not be seen by their respective engineers.

Three of the cars of the excursion train caught fire like a flash, and in a very few minutes nothing was left of them but the wheels, the other iron work, and a few charred timbers and smouldering pieces of the human frame.

It is supposed that 40 or 50 persons were killed besides 60 or 70 more or less severely wounded.
