ARRIVAL OF THE "NIAGARA."

THE R. M. Steamer Canada arrived yesterday, tringing news from Liverpool to the 1st inst.

The intelligence from India is of a very unsatisfactory nature. The mutinous state of the army is manifesting itself more extensively than was expected. Some serious difficulty will be experienced in quelling the disturbances.

The harvest accounts from all parts of Europe grain has been gathered in splendid condition, and the vintage also is very promising.

In Ireland the potato is likely to be more than usually sound and abundant.

Lieutenant General Sir Colin Campbell, G. C. B., has been appointed an extraordinary member of the council of India.

He arrived at Alexandria on the 22nd July. The Niagara took her departure from the Mersey on 27th, having on board one-half of the great Atlantic telegraph cable.

INDIA AND CHINA.

SPREAD OF THE MUTINY-DESTRUCTION OF THE CHINESE FLEET. THE ACTING CONSUL AT TRIESTE TO LORD CLARENDON.

ALEXANDRIA, July 22, 1857.—The Indian mail brings no authentic accounts of the capture of Delhi. It was not taken on the 10th uit., highly gratifying as it is considerate: when General Bernard, having repulsed two sorlies, was waiting reinforcements, which must have Madras, the 27th of June, states positively that official intelligence had reached Madras the pre-

On June 14th the ex-King of Oude, implicated in the con piracy by intercepting papers, was lodged in Fort William, and his followers disarmed. On the same day the native troops at Barrack pore and Calcutta were quietly disarmed.

English troops are arriving fast. An act has been passed by the Legislative

to be withdrawn at pleasure. Our naval forces in China on the 8th of June took a fort, and destroyed about 127 junks, mounting 800 guns.

Three officers and eight men were killed, and three officers and 53 men wounded on our side. The captures of 13 junks on the 27th of May, and 27 junks on the 28th May, are also mentioned.

Some further particulars are given in the following despatch from Trieste :-

ALEXANDRIA, July 23 .- All the troops at Calcutta and Barrackpore have been quietly disarmed. The Christian inhabitants have enfolled themselves as volunteer guards.

dured, are Ourat, Delhi, Russenabad, Honsi, Hissar, Shansi, Bareilly, and Saghenwoor.

On the 15th June another sorue from Delhi was repulsed with great loss. On the 16th all was quiet. Three thousand rebels were encamped outside the Aymeer Gate.

Delhi is defended by 30,000 mutineers. The English troops and inhabitants were acting firmly.

Part of the plot had been to take Calcutta on the 23rd of May. It was most complete in all its arrangements. When discovered, the troops bound for China were sent for as fast as they could arrive.

A list is given of 56 regiments, or portions of regiments, which have mutinied, while 20 have been disarmed and one disbanded; in fact the Bengal army has ceased to exist. The fall of Delhi will do more to quench the rebellion than anything else.

At Benares the mutineers were fired upon with grape. About 100 killed and 200 wounded. The rest fled. There were only eight lies saved by a Sikh prisoner. At Allahabad, best Vermifuge ever invented. where the 6th Regiment had mutinied 26 Europeans and families were killed, including 11 of Dr. Black, Granville Street, richly laden officers; 3000 prisoners liberated themselves, and are plundering.

They overpowered the gendarmerie, and burned down their barracks and the Town Hall, with all its archives, and after exacting a sum of 1,000 piastres from the populace, quitted the town. Apprehensions were felt in Madrid of disturbences there, but, according to the latest accounts, trinquillity was everywhere established, and courts martial were in full operation.
