BOYS OF TEMPERANCE.—The Grand Worthy Patriarch, Rev. Mr. McArthur, arrived in Halifax on Monday evening, on his way to Providence, Rhode Island, for the purpose of attending the Annual meetings of the National Division.

The Rev. Gentleman attended the Mic-Mac Division on Monday evening, and the Howard Association on Tuesday. After addressing the members present on the occasion of his visit, interesting discussion arose on the desirableness of returning to the use of the original Ritual.

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT occurred at Hubble's, Margaret's Bay, on Tuesday in last week. One of the city sportsmen being greatly concerned about his personal safety, took a six barrelled revolver with him on a fishing excursion, but left it at the above house while he went into the woods. It happened that one barrel was loaded, a little boy got the pistol and was at play, held it to his sister, a girl about 14 years of age, and pulled the trigger, when its contents passed into her breast and shoulder. Fortunately it did not prove fatal. The sufferer was brought to town, and has been attended by several surgeons. The efforts to discover the ball, however, have as yet been unavailing.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—As Mr. Wm. McGill of West River (Pictou) was returning from church on Sabbath last accompanied by his wife and Mrs. David Miller, when ascending the Hill above the residence of James McLean, Esq., the horse from some unknown cause shied towards the side of the road and the waggon came in contact with a stump causing all three to be thrown out with great violence. Mr. McGill died on Monday morning from the injuries sustained. Mrs. McGill is also seriously injured, but hopes are entertained of her recovery. Mrs. Miller fortunately escaped with a few severe injuries.—Eastern Chronicle.
