

LONGEVITY.—It is a fact that from January 1 to August 31 there were fourteen persons died in Halifax, whose united ages amounted to 1183 years. Their names are:—Alexr. Troupe, 80; Mary Ready, 78; George Bossom, 78; Mrs. M. Lawson, 81; Capt. Maynard, R. N., 85; Gilbert Hamilton, 80; Mrs. E. Miller, 83; Robert Snooks, 80; Richard Duncan, 97; Mrs. S. Hawkins, 97; J. Grant, 82; Thomas Shipp, 102; McQuinn, 71; Mrs. C. Loynds, 86. Since the present month came in we have to regret the demise of at least two other old inhabitants viz: Mr. Azor Stevens, aged 84, and Mr. Alexr. McDonald, aged 60 years. Probably the oldest man living in the country is John Manning, Esq., of Paimouth, who is nearly a centenarian.—Chronicle.

A TEMPERANCE PIC NIC AT WALLACE.—About half past 1 o'clock about twenty carriages started with Temperance banners and flags streaming in the breeze, for a drive to the beautiful little town of Pagwash, distant about four miles. There they were joined by a goodly number of the sons, daughters and friends of Temperance, accompanied by the Pugwash Brass Band, when the procession then numbering upwards of forty carriages, returned through the beautiful and thriving farming settlement of the Gulf Shore to a highly picturesque spot on the shore near the place whence they started. TROOPS FOR INDIA.—A Telegraphic item in the Boston papers, dated Halifax, August 30th, says: "Orders came by America for four regiments to be immediately equipped for India. Two of them are to go from Halifax, the 62nd and 63rd; one, the 76th, from New Brunswick, and another from Quebec."

THE COAL TRADE.—The present season has been an unusually brisk one in the shipment of coal from this port. Up to the 1st inst., 70,000 chaldrons were exported, and the tonnage in the harbour at the present moment, loading or waiting for cargo, is sufficient to carry some 12,000 chaldrons more. There is no doubt that the shipments at the end of the season will reach to 100,000 chaldrons, if they do not exceed that amount.—Eastern Chronicle.

ARRIVAL OF THE "EUROPA."

THE Royal Mail Steamer Europa arrived this morning, at about 1 o'clock, with further news to the 29th ult. The accounts respecting India are still of a most alarming character, although it does not appear that the Telegraphic Despatches can be fully relied upon. The death of General Barnard and Sir Henry Lawrence was occasioned by wounds received in a sortie from Lucknow. The mutiny does not appear to have extended, but the details of atrocities committed by the native soldiers are, if possible, more terrible than any that have yet reached us. The immediate execution of mutineers, when discovered, has, in some places, restored a degree of quiet and subordination. How long it will continue is impossible to tell. The mutineers still retain Delhi.

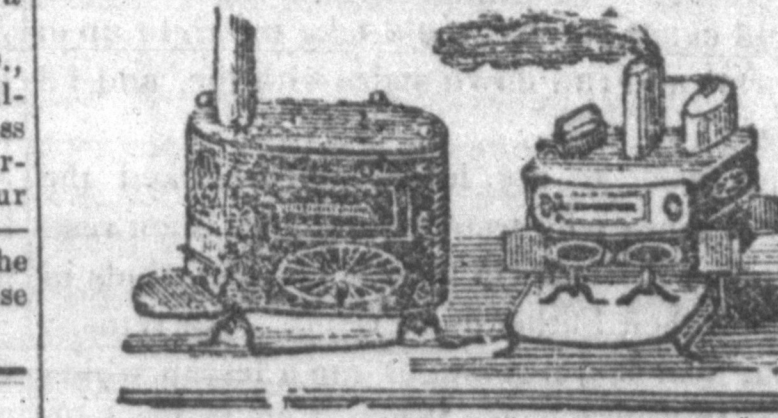
