PROVINCIAL SECRETARY'S OFFICE, HALIFAX, July 15, 1857.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the advice of the Executive Council has been pleased to make the following appointments:—

To be the Chief Inspector of Pickled Fish for the County of Guysborough—James A. Tary, Esquire, in the place of E. H. Francheville, Esquire.

To be Justice of the Peace:—In the County of Cumberland—Charles E. Ratchford, John Travis, William Keiver, Joseph Coates, Douglas Pugsley, William Stewart, (West-chester), Alfred Black, William D. Brundige, Thomas Thomson, and John Bragg, Esquires.

In the County of Victoria—Murdoch McLeod, Esquire.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in Council, has been pleased to vacate the existing Board of School Commissioners in the district of Cumberland proper, and to reconstruct the same, and for that purpose has been pleased to appoint to be Commissioners of Schools in the District of Cumberland proper, in the place of the members of the Board whose seats are hereby vacated, the following persons:—The Rev. Alexander Clarke, Rev. W. McCarty, Rev. E. B. Demill, Rev. Robert Crane, Rev. J. Munro, Rev. Duff, Hon. H. G. Pines, Joseph Oxley, Thomas Logan, Dr. Benjamin G. Page, Elliot Harrison, Gilbert Seaman, Esquires.

His Excellency, by the advice of the Executive Council is pleased to re-establish Sydney, in the Island of Cape Breton, to be a Port of Entry and Clearance, concurrently with North Sydney—and to rescind as far as relates to the Registry of Shipping, the order passed on the 10th June, 1855, in reference to those Ports—hereby reconstituting and establishing the Port of Sydney as a Port of Registry as a Port of Registry for Shipping, and directing the Registry of Shipping at North Sydney to be discontinued and to be restored to the Port of Sydney.

His Excellency has also been pleased to re-appoint—Chas. E. Leonard, Esq., to be a principal officer of Customs and Navigation Laws for the port of Sydney.

BOAT-RACE AGAIN.—The Chronicle announces that arrangements have been made between Mr. J. Lithgow and others, for Halifax, and Mr. Walter Walsh and others, for St. John, N. B., to run the projected boat race on the 12th of August, for \$1,200 a side—the boats to be the Wide Swathe and the old Neptune. It appears that when the racing result of the 23rd was known at St. John, a meeting of the citizens took place; a sum of one thousand pounds was subscribed; and a committee, consisting of the Mayor, late Attorney General, and Speaker of Assembly, was appointed, to challenge the city of Halifax.

We have been informed by a gentleman who has recently visited the Railway line between Halifax and Windsor that in all probability it will be a twelvemonth before that line is finished. Great difficulty is experienced in making a solid way across a certain lake near Mount Uniacke. There are also deep mountain gorges to be filled up and the process of filling them up is very slow. The parties in charge of the Railway appear to be pushing all operations forward with all the energy that could be expected.—Witness.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—CORONER'S INQUEST.—An inquest was held at Annapolis Royal on the 25th July, before Jus. Gray, Justice of Peace, on view of the body of Thomas Tomlinson, mariner, of the schr. Dasher, Capt. Smith. The Jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning. The deceased was engaged in casting off the vessel's fastenings from Hall's wharf when it is presumed he stumbled into a hole in the capstan, and striking his head against some part of the wharf in his fall, was stunned, as he made no attempt to take hold of the ropes thrown to him from the vessel, and as the vessel's boat was fastened to the wharf no other succor could be offered.—Western News.

We have been told by a gentleman from King's county, that a splendid catch of shad was made near Habitant, Cornwallis, one day last week, no less than forty thousand having been stopped, out of which thirty-six thousand were cured.—Id.
