THE LATE HORRIBLE MURDER IN LONDON. -A waterman residing at Woolwich, states that, about three weeks since, a man, of whom he had no previous knowledge, applied to hire his boat. He hesitated to give it to any person who did not allow him to navigate it, but was at length persuaded to lend the boat to the applicant, on the promise that it should be safely returned. The stranger paid half-a-crown for the hire in advance, and rowed down the river. The boat has been picked up off the Kentish coast, and was found to contain a box. in which were placed a saw with fine teeth, a bayonet, a chisel, and one or two other implements which might have been useful in the commission of a deed of violence.

THE VICISSITUDES OF COMMERCE.—The New York Evening Post relates the following remarkable instances of the vicissitudes of com-

" "A few months since the partner of a commercial house in this city was taken to a funatic asylum, utterly deranged, as it was said, by his unparalleled prosperity in business. During the year previous his firm had cleared \$1,300,000. He died in the asylum, and his own estate was valued at \$2,500,000, all invested in the concern of which he was a partner The firm itself failed the other day, and is now said to be utterly insolved. One item of the assets of the deceased's estate was a thousand shares of the Illinois Railroad stock, which was selling at the time of his decease at \$140 per share, and which was worth, after paying up the instalments, \$800,000. The same property sold yesterday at public sale at \$50,000.
